

EMPEROR RECEIVED CHINESE MISSION

APOLOGIZES FOR THE MURDER OF MINISTER

Berlin, Sept. 4.—Emperor William's reception of the Chinese mission of expiation, headed by Prince Chun, which took place to-day at Potsdam, was marked with all the severity consistent with an audience nominally friendly.

RECEPTION ARRANGED TO IMPRESS PRINCE CHUN WITH SOLEMNITY OF OCCASION

The Emperor had evidently arranged the entire ceremony with a view to impressing Prince Chun with the feeling that the ceremony meant expiation for a foul crime, and only through expiation had Prince Chun the right to be treated with princely honors.

WERE NOT READ.

EMERSONIAN CONFERENCE DECLINED TO HEAR MESSAGE FROM THE ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY.

London, Sept. 5.—The Emersonian Methodist conference to-day unanimously declined to hear the secretary read the message of the Archbishop of Canterbury in which he expressed a hope that some day the Methodists would be united with the Episcopalians and another of similar import.

DECLINES TO INTERVENE.

SOLDIERS POISONED.

Over Two Hundred Are Ill and Several May Die. Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 5.—Two hundred and seventy-five soldiers of the 27th Infantry are in hospital at Fort McPherson as a result of poisoning, thought to be from eating a stew cooked at night. Four of them may die.

ENTERTAINING THE PRINCE.

Potsdam, Sept. 5.—The Emperor received Prince Chun at noon. Later the Prince witnessed the field exercises, and the parade march of the regiment of Royal Guards.

COLUMBIA TO DEFEND CUP.

Newport, R. I., Sept. 5.—Columbia has been selected to defend the America cup. The schooner, which has been in the hands of the United States government since the late war, was purchased by the United States government in 1876.

TO LAY HIS VIEWS ON YUKON QUESTIONS BEFORE HON. CLIFFORD SIFTON—CENSUS FIGURES.

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—Commissioner Ross of the Yukon, arrived here yesterday. He was met by J. A. Smead, deputy minister of the interior, and will see Hon. Clifford Sifton when the latter returns from Gananoque to-day. He will lay before the minister of the interior his views on royalty and other questions in Dawson. He intends remaining here a couple of days.

CHANGE OF COMMAND.

A TERRIBLE PUNISHMENT.

German Warship Administers Severe Chastisement to the Natives of Matthias Island. Information regarding the operations of the German warship Cormoran, which was recently ordered to punish the natives for the massacre of Herr Meucker and three or four others, forming a party of German scientists, is given by the British press. THE COAL TRADE.

The Strike Affecting the Demand for Coal in San Francisco. The following is the report of the San Francisco Coal Market for the week ending August 31st, issued by J. W. Harrison, the coal and metal broker: "During the week there have been two arrivals of coal from British Columbia, 5,050 tons; one from Washington, 4,200 tons; three from Oregon, 1,430 tons; one from Australia, 4,222 tons; one from Swansea, 3,540 tons; total, 18,442 tons. Our deliveries this week are about 25 per cent. less than last week, at the same time there is ample here for current requirements. The amount discharged this week from our coast steamers has been larger than for several weeks past. Laborers, although not plentiful, are fully sufficient to meet all our urgent demands. The present strike has been more seriously felt by diminishing the deliveries of domestic coals, still there are more carts waiting to be loaded than there are trucks. The deliveries of steam coals are not materially affected by the labor disturbances. The coal market is becoming more apparent daily, and it is sincerely to be hoped that this month will see the cessation entirely remedied. Coal prices from all sources are strengthening; hence better prices are being obtained for these grades, although the demand for same is light. Oil is reported to be in short supply, and the result is a marked improvement of values. It can be safely stated that large contracts for future delivery cannot be made within twenty-five to thirty per cent. of the prices asked in July, and the outlook is bright, prices will yet prevail before the end of the year."
