SCHOONER ASHORE.

The Wandrain Touched on

Partridge Island. Came Off Shortly Afterwards With

Slight Damage and Proceeded

p. m. for Walton, N. S., with a fullgeneral cargo for her owners, the Nova Scotia Lumber Company, who carry on a large business up there. The Wandrain had troubles enough prior to this to have escaped her experience to this to have escaped her experience off St. John. She was frozen in at New York for a long time and finally reached St. John with a cargo of coal. It was impossible for her to proceed up to Walton for many days. At last she got her cargo and put to sea. Head winds compelled her to return to port, and another departure was made yesterday shortly after noon. The tug Lord Kitchener towed her outside of Partridge Island and then let her go off Anthony's Cove. The wind was from the southwest and blowing hard. Capt. Patterson, fearing that she might go ashore over there, brought the vessel about and made a tack to the westward. The heavy seas and strong

sel about and made a tack to the west-ward. The heavy seas and strong breeze drove her close in to the rocky shores of Partridge Island, and she touched bottom about two and a half hours before low water. She was held up by the rocks on the eastern side of the island near the residence of Dr. March, the port physician. She shifted around and then headed to the eastward. It was reported from the island that she was hung up by the heel by two rocks, and it was also given out two rocks, and it was also given out that she was considerably bliged. Word was sent up to the city by telephone that the Wandrain was in trouble, and E. Kelly, who is in charge there, asked that the Lord Kitchener come down to Ladies and Gentlemen: her assistance. The tug hurried to a position as close to the vessel as she could get, but the heavy seas and the lack of water prevented her getting near enough to be of any material use. Capt. Patterson put on all canvas, hop-ing to get off, and about 7.30 the schooner lifted and ran off the rocks.

schooner lifted and ran off the rocks. It is said she was not making any water, so the commander headed her for Walton and away she went. The Kitchener returned to the harbor during the evening. Capt. Patterson and his crew remained by the vessel throughout, and were given what assistance could be rendered by Mr. Kelly. The Wandrain was built at Parrsboro in 1883 and registers 310 tons. Last year the new owners spent tons. Last year the new owners spent \$12,000 on repairs, so that she was as good as a new vessel. It is said here there is no insurance on the vessel.
