fast mail scheme stands as follows at the present moment: The bill authorizing the construction of the Blacksod harbor and railway connections was unanimously passed by the standing orders committee of the British house of commons, receiving the cordial support of the Irish Nationalists and Irish executive. This is described by the promoters as a critical stage. The bill now comes before the railway committee and the whole house. Little doubt is expressed concerning its adoption. Application is being made to the Canadian ministers for a subsidy of one adian ministers for a service consisting in three and a half days.

Increase upon previous subsidy promised by the Tupper ministry is justified because a twenty-five knot service costs five times as much to run as a twenty-knot service. If Canada grants a million dollars the British government will be asked to grant a mail subsidy of half a million dollars on the basis of the Tupper arrangement. Co-operation of leading companies is assured. An essential condition of the arrangement is that equal facilities be offered at Halifax to the Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk, Canadian Northern and Intercolonial. The promoters declare themselves confident of early success. A mail special from Halifax arrved in the city yesterday afternoon from Halifax. A number of passengers from the S.S. Virginian were on board.

Three special immigrant trains also left Halifax yesterday, the first arriving in the city at 1.20 this morning. The other two arrived at four and five o'clock respectively. Another special of five cars went north by the I. C. R. In all there were 1,400 passengers on the Virginian, the greater number of whom passed through the city on the special trains.



Official Announcement Will Be Made in a Few Days---Engineers Prove Central Route Shortest and Cheapest to Operate, and the Government, as it Prom-

ised, Will Accept Their Recommendation.

OTTAWA, March 10.—Within a day or two it will be officially announced that the government has selected the central or back route through New Brunswick for the National Transcontinental railway between Grand Falls and Chipman, as recommended by the enginers. Surveys have shown that a good line can be obtained across country considerably shorter than by following the St. John river to Fredericton.

The government has had the choice of three routes, one on the river, one of standard grades back from the river and one with a "pusher" grade back from the river. The standard grade back route is 29 miles shorter than the river route is bridge.
