LOCAL NEWS

The three-masted schooner T. M. Roberts reached port this morning.

The regular monthly meeting of the St. John Branch of N. B. Temperance Federation will be held in the W. C. T. U. rooms, Germain St., tonight, at 8 o'clock. All members are requested to attend.

The game between the St. Peter's and St. John's hockey teams, scheduled for tonight on the Shamrock grounds, has been postponed on account of the wet condition of the grounds.

A lady called up Mayor Bullock this morning to ask if the city intended on collecting the dog tax on a dog that was less than a year old. The mayor regretfully explained that even pups of tender age could not escape the stern mandate of the law.

A Mr. McDonald of St. Martins, has laid a complaint at the police court against Mr. Fred Peters for assault. He says he cuts deals at Loch Lomond and hauls them to Ryan's yard at the Marsh Bridge; that he learned of some deals being used by men in the employ of Mr. Peters, and when he asked Mr. Peters about the matter the latter ordered him from the office, threatened him with a window blind, said things to him; and two others finally ejected him from the premises on Walker's Wharf. The case will be heard at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning.

On Wednesday evening last at the residence of Rev. Gideon Swin, 118 Waterloo street, Ernest M. Hall, of North Sydney, was united in matrimony with Miss Nellie May Donovan, of Fredericton. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Swin in the presence of a few friends of the contracting parties. Mr. Hall was supported by Norman Burton, while the bride was attended by Miss Lillian McCormack. Mr. and Mrs. Hall are now in Fredericton visiting the latter's parents. They will make their home in North Sydney.

Word was received this morning by L. A. Curry, of the Hamstead Steamship Co., that the steamer Hamstead, which grounded at Gagetown, is not seriously injured. She will be pumped out and some temporary repairs probably made and it is expected that she will be brought down to St. John tonight or tomorrow morning.

The steamer sank at her wharf at Gagetown at two o'clock Saturday morning, after having filled with water. The cause of the leak is a mystery, and the owners intend to take all possible measures to discover when and how it happened. When the steamer was inspected at midnight, after having tied up at the wharf, she seemed to be all right, and there was no sign of a leak.

When the discovery was made by one of the crew the engine room was partially filled with water, which had extinguished the fires in the boilers. The steamer was already beginning to careen, and as it was impossible to get up steam there was not much that could be done to avoid the disaster. The deck hands were quickly aroused and succeeded in saving the greater portion of their personal belongings. With the aid of ropes the crew succeeded in grounding the bow of the steamer before she filled and sank.

Yesterday afternoon the tug William H. Murray, accompanied by two scows, left Indiantown for Gagetown to raise the boat. They carried two sticks of pitch pine lumber and had a crew of eight men. A powerful pump secured at the St. John Iron Works was also part of the apparatus taken.

When she arrives in St. John the steamer will be placed on Gregory's blocks for repairs. The accident, coming, as it does, at the busiest time of the year, will cause serious inconvenience to the residents between Fredericton and Gagetown, on which route the boat has been running this spring.

The West India steamer Sobro, Captain Bridges, arrived in port about 10 o'clock this morning, and docked at the Pettigill Wharf. The officers report having had splendid weather on the whole trip. They completely escaped the storm which did so much damage on the eastern coast last Saturday and Sunday.


