### ABE ATTELL SCORES KNOCK-OUT ON YOUNG PIERCE

Jack Dorman Fought With Broken Arm—  
Important Decision Regarding Boxing  
In New York Court.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., March 10.—Abe Attell knocked out Young Pierce colored, of this city, tonight in the sixth round of what was scheduled as a fifteen round bout, before the Olympic Athletic Association at Essington. The best Pierce could do was to jab light lefts to the face and these blows had no appreciable effect on Attell.

NEW YORK, March 10.—The bout between Jack Dorman and Johnny Dwyer at the Sharkey A. C. here tonight, was cut short at the end of the sixth round by the discovery that Dorman had broken his right arm. The fifth and six rounds were fought by Dorman with his right arm hanging limply by his side useless.

NEW YORK, March 10.—A decision which many believe will seriously affect the future of boxing in New York was rendered today in the court of special sessions, when Leach Cross, the pugilist, Bert Keyes, Joseph Hungaria, Gus Bagley and seven other defendants, were convicted of conducting a prize fight in the rooms of the now defunct Grant Athletic Union in the Old Star Theatre a year ago. Each of the eleven defendants was allowed to go on suspended sentence.

### HARTLAND MAN CHARGED WITH THEFT OF LOGS

HARTLAND, N. B., March 10.—Today Constable James W. Wolverson arrested H. N. Boyer, a prominent business man of this town, on a warrant issued from the court of Police Magistrate Dibblee of Woodstock. The warrant charged theft of logs on the river and was sworn out by Louis H. Ellis, secretary treasurer of the St. John River Log Driving Company. The preliminary hearing will be held at Woodstock on Saturday. A. W. Clark and G. C. Watson went bail for the accused.

**Raft Stranded**  
During the high water last season a raft was stranded on the head of Matheson's Island, opposite this village. The raft remained there until about ten days ago, when Mr. Boyer hauled the logs to the shore and banded them. Thomas E. Hilyard and the man whom he employed last season as marker came from St. John and examined the logs, with the result that the marker has alleged to have absolutely identified them as those he had sealed and marked. The raft was made at the mouth of the Tobique and Mr. Hilyard sought to figure in its construction, though the loss bore the marks of different lumbermen. Mr. Boyer excused himself from wrong doing under the belief that the parties from whom he bought the logs had perfect right to sell. The case is somewhat complicated and will doubtless prove interesting.

### MALLOY TAKEN AT VANCEBORO

VANCEBORO, Me., March 10.—After nearly three months of freedom, enjoyed with the funds which it is alleged he had absconded from the town of Mattawamkeag and from the American Express Company, John H. Malloy was arrested here today by Deputy Sheriff John W. Haskell of Lincoln. He offered no resistance. When arrested Malloy said that he had but little remaining of the several thousand dollars which he had when he left Mattawamkeag in December. Since that time he has been in several places in Massachusetts and Maine. Malloy was employed by the American Express Company as its agent in Mattawamkeag and was also treasurer of the town. Most of the funds which the authorities say he took away with him belonged to the express company.

Under custody of Deputy Sheriff Haskell, Malloy was taken to Bangor and lodged in the county jail tonight to be held for trial.
