A BICYCLE THIEF SHOT THREE MEN

Windsor, Ont., May 8.—Without word of warning Herman Martin, a Krampton, Ont., resident, was suspected of having stolen a bicycle, pulled a .25 calibre revolver out of his pocket and shot the officers who were at search him at police headquarters last night, slaying five shots in quick succession, four of which took effect. George Hamby, caretaker of City Hall, most seriously wounded, a bullet entering through the fleshy part of his side and lodging in his back just below the shoulder. Police Sergeant William Reid was shot twice; one ball took a piece of a finger of his left hand and another hit him in the right shoulder, making a hair, but not a serious wound. Policeman William Carter was shot through the right arm. That none of the officers was killed was a little short of a miracle, as the shots were fired at a range less than five feet. Immediately after the shooting the prisoner ran out of the building and hid in McLain's lumber yard close by, where he was captured a few minutes later by Policemen MacIsaac and Martin. He made no resistance and was taken back to the police headquarters and locked up. The nature of the shooting spread like wildfire through the city, and rumors that the least word of the policeman had been murdered brought hundreds to the scene. As near as can be learned, would-be murderer, who gives the name as Herman Martin, aged 36 years, but whose real name is not known, was brought to Windsor yesterday morning from Chatham. He was brought with him a bicycle which he attempted to sell at a second-hand store. The dealer had just been informed by the police, who Martin was resting on suspicion of having stolen the wheel.

A dispatch says that cheap lighting for Toronto apartment houses is being realized. Alexander Dow, the Detroit electrical expert, is supervising a construction of a distribution plant in the city. The lighting, Mr. Atken, has prepared a schedule for house loads. Under this schedule, which is on the line of that used in Detroit, the average load per house is 100 watts, has proved eminently successful, proposed to establish a flat rate of ten cents per room per month.
