TRIED TO RING FALSE ALARM

I.C.R. Watchman's Timely Arrival Saves Fire Department a Needless Run—Guilty Party Escapes.

Had it not been for the timely arrival of John Middleton, night watchman at the I. C. R. freight office, the fire department would, about 11.30 o'clock last evening, be obliged to respond to a false alarm.

Mr. Middleton was in the office with John Kelly, a clerk of the I. C. R. when he saw a young man pass the window and stand gazing in. He kept his eye closely upon the man who remained at the window for some time. Thinking it strange that the person should be about the premises at that hour of the night Mr. Middleton went outside and enquired of the stranger what business he had about the place. He repeated his question, while the young man made no reply but remained with his back turned steadily edging his way towards Pond street.

The watchman was still ignorant as to what the young man had been doing near the window. But on approaching he discovered that the glass in the private box in the I. C. R. office had been broken, and then he understood that the young man was attempting to ring in a false alarm when he was interrupted.

Mr. Kelly and the night watchman then tried to head off the miscreant by going round the other side of the building, but the young man who had been caught in the act ran at full speed along Pond street and disappeared from view.

Mr. Middleton at once reported the matter to Officer O'Leary and was able to give a good description of the man.

Washington, July 10.—Jack Johnson's announcement that he would never return to the United States caused Department of Justice officials immediately to consider steps to bring about the forfeiture of his \$50,000 personal bond pending in Chicago for his appearance in connection with white slave indictments upon which he has not yet been tried. Judge Carpenter a few days ago declined to declare the bond forfeited until it was clear that Johnson would not appear when wanted.

Jack Johnson may not find refuge in France, in the opinion of the State Department. The Federal attorneys say that while probably there is no provision in the extradition treaty with France under which his surrender could be demanded, the French authorities, even without a formal appeal from the United States government, may deport Johnson, as, like most European countries, France is understood to have laws prohibiting the immigration of a person convicted of crime in his own country.

Have, France, July 10.—Jack Johnson, the colored pugilist, arrived here today on board the Constantin, and immediately on landing announced his determination never to return to the United States. He said he would in the future take up his residence in Paris.

Paris, July 10.—"Jack" Johnson, the negro heavyweight prize fighter, accompanied by his wife and his nephew, arrived in Paris this afternoon from the United States by way of Havre.

That the women of Turkey after centuries spent in social bondage are coming into their own and taking a place in the industrial world and in educational pursuits was the declaration yesterday of three American women who returned from Constantinople, where they are professors in the American College for Girls. They arrived on board the steamship Irtis, of the Cunard line, from Mediterranean ports.

The three women are Dr. Mary Mills Patrick, of Boston, president of the American College for Girls; Dr. Louise B. Wallace, of Montreal, N. J., professor of art; and Dr. Isabel Frances Dodd, of Montreal, N. J., professor of art.

ISMAIS IS TO STAND TRIAL IN THIS CITY

Will be Given Chance to Make Losses Good in Boston, but Alberts Gov't will Press Case.

During the past week the developments in the case of Richard D. Isaacs, who is held by the Boston authorities on the charge of swindling three Boston people in Western land deals, have been marked. Isaacs is claiming to have been reached whereby Isaacs is to pay back the money, and in return receive the land titles, which he claims are of value. The total amount in this branch of the complicated case is \$1,000, and pending its payment Isaacs is confined in the Boston jail.

When first arrested in New York by the Pinkerton Detective a large roll of money was found in his possession. Judging from the size of the roll of bills, it was estimated that Isaacs had fully \$5,000, but when counted it amounted to only \$1,000. This account for Isaacs being now in jail instead of accepting bail, which was placed at \$5,000. When released in Boston, as it is understood, he will be, the prisoner will be brought here to face the charges preferred by the government of Alberta.

G. P. Fenwick, deputy provincial attorney of Alberta, is at present in the city at the Royal. In connection with the case Mr. Fenwick stated to The Standard that the Alberta government are determined to bring Isaacs here for trial. There are no new developments in the local end of the case.

Mr. Fenwick will leave today for the West.

TO SET PERCENTAGE RECORD.
Walter Johnson may not break Joe Wood's 1912 won and lost record, but if he continues in his present shape he will mark that which is probably unequalled. He has been the National's big winner. His team has seldom scored heavily for him.

But with his record of shut outs and low score games and four months left to the season, the big Washington twirler looks good to set a mark for the smallest percentage of earned runs that will stand for years. This is the final test evolved for the efficiency of pitchers.

County Court Chambers.
The case of O'Connell vs. S. D. Lohm was commenced before Judge Lohm in the county court chambers yesterday. This is an action for scrap iron which the plaintiff alleges he sold the defendant. The amount in dispute is \$140, and the defendant claims a set off amounting to \$80. The case will be resumed this morning at 10 o'clock.

J. F. H. Teed appeared for the plaintiff and Dr. W. B. Wallace, K.C., for the defendant.

THE FIREMEN HAVE A VERY BUSY HALF YEAR

Slight Blaze This Morning Brought Total Number of Alarms Since January 1st to Date Almost Up to Century Mark.

This morning about 1.30 o'clock an alarm was sent in from box 13 for a fire in the grocery store kept by Joseph Releker, on the corner of St. Patrick and Richmond streets. The fire caught from some matches on one of the shelves and is thought to have been the work of mice. The fire burned the portion of the shelves and some of the groceries, while it filled the living apartments of Mr. Releker upstairs full of smoke. The damage will amount to about a hundred dollars. The building is owned by Susanna Burke.
