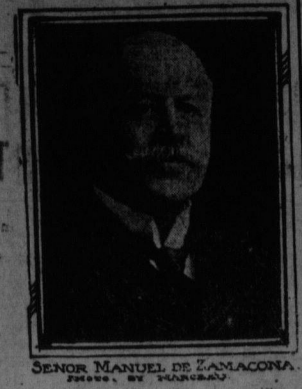

WEST LAND REGULATIONS

This code deals with a family, or any male
over 18 years old, who has homesteaded a
quarter section of available Dominion land
in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.
Application must be made in person at the
Division Lands Agency of Sub-Agency
for the district, or by proxy may be
made at the office of any Local Agent of
the Dominion Lands Agency, subject to
certain conditions.
