

In view of the considerable trade transacted by Canadian firms in the export of cheese to the United Kingdom, the following paragraph taken from the English Grocer which sums ip the present position and outlook for the cheese trade, may be quoted for the information of Canadian ship-

for the information of Canadian snip-pers:—
"The cheese position, which has been one of depression for several months, seems to be showing signs of improvement. The reasons for the change are not difficult to define. In the spring of the year, when prices were high, abnormal quantities of cheese from the United States were shipped to English ports. Shortly after the cheese commenced to arrive, large shipments from New Zealand
