

SHEDDING TOWN A WINNER IN CONTEST WITH MONCTON CITY

that the city of Moncton had never attempted to enforce the laws in Shediac and did not propose doing so. He said that it was all a question of enforcing the Scott Act and every man in Moncton, who was interested in the enforcement of the act was in favor of the present bill. That was also the case with many people living in the counties of Westmorland and Kent. He felt that he would not be discharging his duty to his constituency, if he did not oppose the bill, for it would be a mistake from the standpoint of the temperance cause if it passed the house.

N. B. Power Co.

Hon. Mr. Foster moved that the fees paid on bills relating to the Nepequin improvement commission, the N. B. Power Co., and the municipality of Victoria be refunded, the bills having been withdrawn. The house again went into committee with Mr. LeBlanc in the chair and took up further consideration of the St. John assessment bill.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that the bill had been agreed to by the committee on the previous evening, with the exception of two sections which had been held over for further consideration. He submitted an amendment to section 8 which provided that that part of the old act exempting from taxation the company's property exclusively used for railway purposes shall remain in force until the next meeting of the legislature, and no longer.

Hon. Mr. Byrne then explained the terms of the agreement entered into between the province and the St. John Railway Co., in Dec. 1912 by which the railway Co. was to have the use of the bridge over the Reversing Falls for a period of twenty years. The company had agreed to pay \$3,000 a year for the first five years, \$4,000 for the second years and \$5,000 per year thereafter, subject to the right of readjustment. It was also provided by the agreement that the Co's rate of fare was not to be increased. Although the agreement had been entered into, it had never been submitted to the legislature and it was not quite clear why that had not been done. The matter of the agreement had only recently been brought to the notice of the government and it was only right that the government should have time to consider it before recommending the legislature to ratify it. In the meantime it was thought best to allow the old law to stand. The bill was agreed to as amended. The bill to incorporate the Demoselle Summer Resort Company was agreed to by the committee with amendment inserted by the committee on corporations.

St. John Assessments.

The bill relating to the assessment of rates and taxes in the city of St. John was taken up for consideration of certain sections.

Section 8, relating to the assessment of the New Brunswick Power Co., was amended to provide that all exemptions provided by existing legislation should continue in effect as before the passage of this bill and until the end of the session of 1919. Hon. Mr. Byrne explained the amendment wished time to consider the effect of the bill on existing legislation.

Section 11, relating to the assessment of steam railways was agreed to without change.

The bill was recommended as amended. On the bill relating to the town of Dalhousie Dr. McGrath expressed opposition to the principle of the bill being given by towns and cities to concerns of various kinds in competition with other communities. He did not think that any kind of a rate structure should be permitted. The industry should be left to work out their own salvation. The bill was recommended with amendments and the committee arose and reported.

Miscellaneous Bills Passed.

Various bills were read a third time and passed as follows: Bill relating to the assessment of rates and taxes in the city of St. John, to appoint a commission in the matter of the New Brunswick Power Company, to incorporate the Demoselle Summer Resort Company, relating to the town of Dalhousie to amend chapter 122 consolidated statutes, to amend the Companies Act relating to sewers and marsh lands in the parishes of Hope-well and Dorchester, relating to the town of Woodstock, to amend the act respecting municipalities, to provide for inspection and registration of stations, to provide for the purchase and sale of sheep, to amend the theatres act, to provide for Workmen's Compensation, to confirm an agreement between the military hospitals commission and the board of the St. John County Hospital, respecting public health, respecting the St. John River Log Driving Company, respecting the manufacture of pulp, to recover money illegally held or retained, relating to vocational education, to provide funds for building permanent highways, to authorize inquiries into charges against Hon. Wm. Currie, to amend the judicature act, relating to the town of Shediac, to confirm the title of the crown in lands in Sunbury County, to authorize the R. C. Bishop of Chatham to change the names of Fredericton, to change the names of various persons named Larsen, to vest certain real estate in East Florenceville, and to revise and amend the act respecting the Miramichi Bay Shore Railway Company.

Supplementary Estimates.

Hon. Mr. Murray (provincial secretary) presented a message from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor submitting the supplementary estimates for the current year as follows: Agriculture, bonus to butter and cheese factory \$5,000. Legislature—Officers and messengers \$254.25. Extra allowance to members \$100.

Natural History Society (St. John)

Public Health, chief of laboratories (bacteriologist and pathologist) \$2,500. Laboratory equipment, \$2,000. Expenses, census, vital statistics, publicity, laboratory, etc., \$600. Smallpox accounts Kent county from 1910, \$2,432.49.

Technical education, vocational school, surveying (revue), \$2,000. Hon. Mr. Murray (provincial secretary) moved that the message and estimates be referred to the committee on supply, and on the order of the day being called the House resolved into committee on supplies with Mr. Burchill in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale on the item of \$5,000 for bonus to butter and cheese factory said that this was a grant for Sussex Cheese and Butter Company under an agreement by which the department of agriculture would make use of portions of their plant for constructional purposes in connection with agricultural education. The previous plant had been destroyed by fire and the arrangement proposed would be much more economical than an attempt to provide a separate plant for the use of the department. The company had bought out a competing concern and the prospects for its future were better than they had been. The agreement provided for the use of the plant by the department for a number of years.

Hon. Mr. Murray (Kings) approved of the grant. The destruction of one plant by fire had made an amalgamation possible and conditions would be better than they had been in the past.

Hon. Mr. Murray (provincial secretary) explained that the item of \$2,432.49 for smallpox accounts Kent county, provided for an adjustment of accounts between the province and the municipality. The province had claimed against the municipality on account of the Provincial Hospital and expenses in connection with smallpox epidemics in recent years had been claimed as a set off. The matter had been adjusted in January of the current year. Hon. Mr. Murray submitted the usual supply bills for necessary public services.

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Hon. Mr. Foster announced that His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor would attend to prorogue the House at 7.30 p. m. and the public accounts committee's report would be received at 7.15.

The Speaker left the chair to resume at 7.15.

Closing Session.

On the House resuming at 7.15 p. m., Mr. Magee presented the following report of the committee on public accounts:

"The committee on public accounts has met eleven times during this session of the legislature and the members have given close attention to the report of the auditor general concerning the accounts of the province. The receipts of the provincial revenue in all branches had our consideration. Your committee commends the new method of showing the provincial financial report the liabilities of the province at the end of the fiscal year. They also approve of the statement of capital assets and liabilities as shown on pages A 44 and A 45 being of the opinion that the statement of the finances of the province should be made as plain as is possible for the benefit of the people generally.

The amounts due by municipalities to the provincial hospital still continue large and we would recommend prompt collections of these sums.

We would suggest also that all road supervisors be authorized to report to the department of agriculture the automobiles which they know are operating their cars without license. Town and municipal authorities should be encouraged to report violations of the motor vehicle act in this regard.

The expenditures of the Jordan Sanatorium still continue high for the number of patients annually treated. Under the present system your committee find that the supervisors of roads render their accounts promiscuously and recommend that they mail their statements either monthly or semi-monthly so as to ensure a proper check of the pay list as submitted and the prompt payment of accounts.

As careful an inspection as possible with the time at our disposal was made by your committee of the expenditures on ordinary roads and bridges as well as payment on account of permanent roads. Your committee recommends that careful attention be given by all officials that work undertaken under the permanent roads fund has the permanency that warrants bonding.

Unsubstantiated information was produced before the committee tending to show misappropriation of funds in certain parts of the province in connection with the building of roads. The minister of public works appearing before the committee assured them that an investigation of all such charges would be made promptly under oath.

Your committee further recommends that the sum of \$50 be paid Mr. Keefe who so efficiently acted as their secretary.
