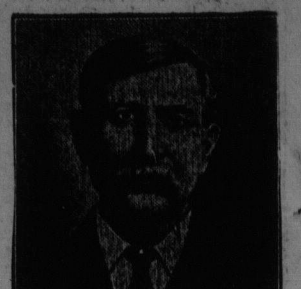

THE MISSION TO THE VATICAN

Mr. Cecil Harmsworth, yesterday, told the House of Commons Committee considering the Civil Service Estimates, that since the last meeting, when there was a motion to reduce the Foreign Office Vote of £1,000,000 by £4,000, the cost of the special mission, in view of the feeling exhibited by the committee the matter had been under the careful consideration of the Government, and he regretted he could not give the final decision of the War Cabinet. It was originally intended as a war-time mission, the business of the Envoy being to keep the Pope fully informed as to the objects of the Allies in entering into this war and to remove any misapprehensions. The matter could not be decided abruptly (hear, hear). He hoped a decision would be reached in a few days, and if it was decided not to continue the mission the estimates would be accordingly reduced.  
Mr. Cotes said he and his constituents felt strongly on the matter, and were not going to let it lie. They felt they had not got value for their money. He did not wish to embarrass the Government, and under the circumstances he would withdraw the motion.

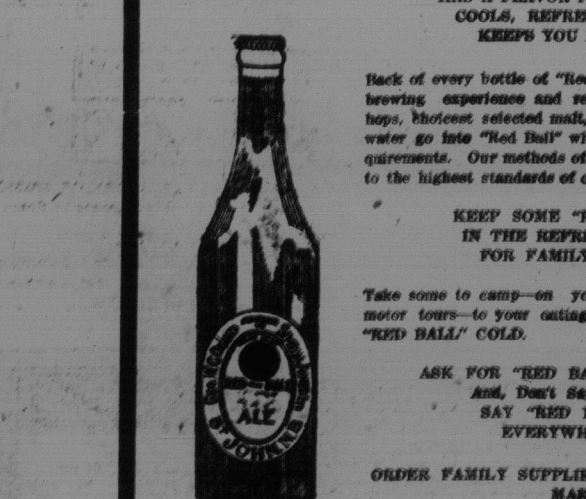
COLLECTION OF PARISH TAXES
