FREDERICTON BOWLING TEAM CAPTURED THE CHAMPIONSHIP

Bowlers from the Capital Finished Strong and Take the Trophy to the Capital—Y. M. C. A. and Y. M. C. I. Tied for Second Place—Calais and Blacks Tied for Third—Amherst Rolled in Hard Luck.

The Maritime Provinces and Maine Bowling Championship Tournament closed on Black's Alley last evening, and the coveted silver pin, the trophy for which the six teams have battled so hard during the last two days, will journey on to the capital this morning with the 1920 Champions, the Fredericton bowling team.

Six games were rolled yesterday, and the high runs made in the first day's play were still maintained in the last day of play. The Fredericton bowlers in particular played a fine and steady game, finishing with four wins and one game lost.

The Y. M. C. I., which won all their games on the first day, weakened under the final strain and dropped two yesterday. The Y. M. C. A. won two of the three they played yesterday, and thus finished second, with the Y. M. C. I. Calais won one and lost one yesterday, and Black's did the same, thus tying for third place. Amherst played a streak of hard luck and lost all the games they played.

While the two St. John teams who came so close to hitting the trophy will regret to see it leave the city, where it has been resident for some time, all concede that the better team won, and it is to the benefit of the sport that an outside team proved victorious.
