NEW POSTAL INSURANCE  
Insurance on parcel postage in Can-  
ada will come into effect on October  
1. Parcels will be accepted for in-  
surance against loss up to \$100. The  
fees will be 3c up to \$5; 6c up to \$25;  
12c up to \$50; 90c for amounts over  
\$50 and not exceeding \$100. Notice  
is also gazetted that on and after Oc-  
tober 1 the rates of letters for points  
outside of Canada, with the exception  
of places within the British Empire,  
the United States and Mexico (to  
which places the Canadian domestic  
rate applies), will be 10c for each let-  
ter weighing one ounce or less, with  
5c for each further ounce. The rates  
on postcards will be six cents.
