Clears his Name after 38 Years.

After thirty-eight years, William Hushon, former tax collector of the township of Colchester South, near Windsor, has been able to clear himself of the stigma of a suspected short, ago in his accounts. At the end of 1880 Mr. Hushon was found to be apparently short \$600 when final reckoning with the Treasurer was made.
