PRaises Canada's STAND ON TITLES MATTER

LONDON DAILY NEWS PLEAS-
ED WITH DOMINION'S STAND
LONDON May 5.—The Daily News,
commenting to-day on the story of
Ottawa correspondence of what has
taken place in Canada in regard to
honors says:
"It is clear that the title business,
so far as Canada is concerned is do-
omed and when it is achieved the British
commonwealth will owe a very con-
spicuous debt of gratitude to the Do-
minion."

The Daily Chronicle says the usual
argument against the withdrawal of
hereditary titles is that the Crown
would be then left in a position of
dangerous isolation. "But we are com-
ing to realize that the crown plays
absolutely no essential part in the
British community of free nations. Its
position requires no supports or butt-
resses beyond its own practical vir-
tues."

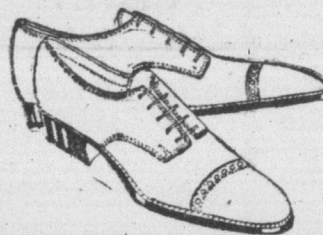
The death occurred of Mrs. Fred
