HOME RULE.

Gladstone's Great Speech in

the British Parliament.

Lines Upon Which the Irish

Difficulty will be Settled.

Powers and Privileges for a

Parliament at Dublin.

Constitutional Rights that

England Will Retain.

LONDON, April 8.—As soon as the usual

formalities attending the opening of

parliament were over, it was voted to

postpone the reading and answering of

all questions on the notice paper. Hardly

had this been done when, at 4 p.m.,

Gladstone entered the house. His en-

trance was followed by loud and pro-

longed cheers, which were continued for

several minutes. Among Liberals and

Parliament the wildest enthusiasm pre-

valued, and it was safe to say that no such

scene was ever witnessed before in the

house of commons.

Before going to the house of commons,

Gladstone's journey was a roar of ap-

plause, hearty and great enough to make

most statesmen dizzy, and when the

whole immense multitude caught the

signal one tremendous, long-sustained

cheer was sent up, the like of which was

never before heard in London, and which

was plainly audible in the house. The

cheering continued until long after

Gladstone had entered the parliament

buildings. Within the buildings the

prime minister's reception, though less

demonstrative, was equally enthusiastic

with that he had just received without.

He was apparently in the best of spirits

and bowed right and left to his acquaint-

ances as he passed them.

GLADSTONE

on rising to speak was received with

deafening cheers. After it had subsided,

he said: I could wish it had been pos-

sible to expound to the house the whole

policy and intention of the government

with reference to Ireland. Although

questions of reform in the tenure of land

and the Irish government are so closely

and inseparably connected, it is yet im-

possible to undertake the task of elu-

cidating both questions together. I do

not know of any previous task laid

upon me involving so diversified an

exposition. In contemplating the mag-

nitude of this task, I am filled with

painful misgiving, but that misgiving is

absorbed in the feeling of responsibility

that will be upon me if I should fail to

bring home to the public mind the

magnitude and various aspects of the

question. We should no longer fence or

skirmish with this question. (Loud

cheers.) We should take means not
