London, April 8 .- As soon as the usual rmalities attending the opening of arliament were over, it was voted to ostpone the reading and answering of all questions on the notice paper. Hardly had this been done when, at 4 p m, Gladstone entered the house. His entrance was followed by loud and prolonged cheers, which were continued for several minutes.
