

MOTT'S BROMA.

THE following observations having reference to the preparation of BROMA, appeared in a late number of the Boston Medical Journal. A few years since a great manufacturer of Broma sought the opinions of many medical gentlemen of distinction for the purpose of procuring an objectionable food for invalids, and was assured that he had fully succeeded. Hospitals, infirmaries, and households generally, should always be provided with it. When gruel, arrowroot, green barley, starch, rice, farina, and many other things ordinarily resorted to for patients are of no utility, the Broma is sometimes resorted to. It is certainly a point well worth while to determine, whether the chocolate drinkers have been secure in other infected cities.
