La Crosse was introduced into England in August, 1867, by Captain Johnson, a Canadian, who brought over a *troupe* of eighteen Indians, chiefly Iroquois, but including representatives, it was stated, of the Onondagas, Cayugas, Senecas, Oneidas, Mohawks, and Algonquins. Of course they were not all of pure Indian blood. They first made a tour in the United States, and then came over here. The *Field* of August 3rd contains the following:—"Captain Johnson brought over eighteen Iroquois Indians in the *Peruvian* last week, for the purpose of introducing the national game of Canada into England.
