

IT WAS A REGULAR TIDAL WAVE

Liberals Almost Made a Clean Sweep--Conservatives Receive the Most Decisive Defeat Ever Administered to a Party in the History of Canada--Sir Charles Tupper, Hon. Hugh John Macdonald and Hon. George E. Foster Are Among the Defeated.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 7.—The elections for the Canadian house of commons which took place today resulted in the return of the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier by a margin of a much larger majority than he had in the last house. In only one province did the government show a loss of strength. Ontario showed great Conservative gains but they were quite insufficient to offset the stampede of the other provinces to the Liberal cause.

At midnight the returns from Quebec indicate the election of only six Conservatives among the 65 members from that province. In the last house the Conservatives had 16 members, a loss of ten. New Brunswick all went strongly Liberal, while the government made substantial gains in Nova Scotia. Every member of the government was re-elected, and many of them by large majorities. On the other hand, every member of the last Conservative government seeking election with the two exceptions was badly defeated. Sir Charles Tupper was badly beaten in Cape Breton county, a sure constituency. His son, Sir C. H. Tupper, narrowly escaped defeat in Pictou, N. S. In St. John, N. B., Hon. G. E. Foster, treasurer in the late government, and one of the most brilliant debaters in Canadian public life, was badly beaten by Hon. A. G. Blair.

Hon. J. G. Bergeron, Conservative leader in Quebec, and Hon. W. H. Montague, one of the Conservative leaders in Ontario, were all defeated. The issues of the campaign were not sharply defined. The racial question played a prominent part. The other issues were mostly local. Prosperity was the chief argument of the Liberal speakers. The defeat of the Conservatives is one of the most decisive in the history of Canadian politics.

THE BONANZA MINE
