### Many Guns, Much Ammunition Landed For Huerta In Mexico

No Effort Was Made By Lord Mersey For United States Warships To Prevent the Debarkation of War Supplies.

Washington, May 30.-Huerta has inally succeeded in obtaining for his orces several million rounds of amnunition and a large consignment of machine guns and rifles.

The Hamburg-American steamship piranaga and Bavaria have landed these cargoes of munitions at Puerto. Mexico. The Ypiranaga's cargo, estimated at about 15,000,000 rounds of ammunition and more than two hundred machine guns, was landed today. It is the identical cargo United States held up through seizure of Vera Cruz. In fact, the decision of the Administration to move suddenly against Vera Cruz was reached solely because of the fact that the Ypiranaga was about to land this big consignment of war supplies. Thus five weeks after Vera Cruz was taken Official List at a considerable sacrifice of American life, the very arms and ammunition which were responsible for the American invasion have been landed without any opposition from the Unit-
