FRONT OF YONGE.

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IMPORTANT SUIT ON LIEN NOTES.

A Division Court case of "The
Massey Mfg. Co. v. Harper" has attracted
considerable interest in Ontario,
and we make room for a brief sum-
mary of the principal points of the
case.

On the 9th of August, 1886, Ira
Harper, of Osnabrock, Stormont, gave
a written order to the Massey Mfg. Co.
for a self binding reaping machine, the
price agreed upon being \$225, in equal
payments falling due on the first of
January, 1887, 1888 and 1889. A
condition on the face of the order was
as follows: "I have possession and use of machine
but property therein is not to pass to me until
I have paid the full price of the machine
therefor, or any part thereof. If I make
any default in the payment of the price
of the machine, the Massey Mfg. Co. shall
have the right to take possession of the
machine and to sell the same to pay the
balance of the price thereof."

On the back of the order was the
usual form which is filled up and signed
by the buyer, giving a statement of his
affairs in order to obtain credit.
This form, however, was not filled in
and was not signed by Harper. At the
same time Harper gave the com-
pany three promissory notes for \$75
each, payable as per terms of the order.
On the face of the notes the following
conditions were recited: -
"In the event of the sale or other disposal
of my land or personal property then in
my possession, I hereby irrevocably and
exclusively assign to the Massey Mfg. Co.
the title and right to possession of the pro-
perty hereinbefore mentioned, and I shall
in the Massey Mfg. Co. until this note or any
other note of mine is paid."

In Jan., 1887, Harper paid \$30 on
account of note matured, and in June
following the company's agent took
possession of the machine and sold it for
\$100, without advertising and
without notifying Mr. Harper. In
September the company entered suit
against Harper for the balance on all
the notes, claiming that as he was dis-
posing of his personal property that he
was bound to notify Mr. Harper of the
sale and to pay the balance of the notes
then due by reason of the first
condition contained in them. The
action was tried on the 4th of
November last, and after taking the
evidence the court adjourned the case
for a week or two.
