A PORTABLE TENT.

my, Light, Strong, Durable and Eastly Erected—Storm Proof in Almost Any Situation.

show herewith an illustration taken from The Scientific American, of an improved portable tent which is light and room, very strong and durable and capable of erection very durable and capable of erection very quickly in a storm-proof and reliable manner, either on rocky, sandy or loam soil. The use of ridgepoles, upright and inclined posts and the numerous belaying pegs usually employed is entirely dispensed with, and in their place a pair of detachable frame arches and several anchors are used.

Each frame is made up of two straight and two curved wooden secstraight and two curv

straight and two curved wooden sec-tions, and is braced by a rod formed at the ends with pins, which fit into sockets in the ends of the frame.



THE TENT ERECTED

The frame sections are held together by metal socket pieces or couplings. In erecting the tent the two frame rches are spaced apart at a suitable interval and the tent cover is drawn

This covering is made with strap-This covering is made with strapped seams and is approximately semi-cylindrical in shape, with tapered ends, as illustrated. The latter are secured by pegs driven into the ground, and guy ropes extend from the top of the frame arches to a suitable anchorage on each side of the tent. the tent.

If the tent is ercted on rocky ground a hook may be used to anchor the guy ropes, but in sandy ground the anchor is formed of a metal plate, from the periphery of which several wire strands extend to a common ring, to which the guy rope is secured.

The tent covering is formed along its edge with an outwardly extending flange, and the door of the tent opens into one or both of the tapered ends. Curtains separate the main body of the tent from these tapered ends. ends.

A New Alloy. Invar, an alloy which when heated contracts instead of expands, has recently been invented by Dr. Guillaune, the physicist. It consists of nickel and steel, therefore of two metals which each for itself expands rather considerably in heat. Correct measurements have, however, shown that Dr. Guillaune has really produc-ed alloys which when heated expand-even less than marble or wood and when slightly changed in their composition even contract when heated.
Preportions of compositions of al-leys have also been found so that they neither expand nor contract, but remain the same in all degrees

A NEW USE FOR THE CAMERA.

A new method of measuring for tailors has been patented in Paris. The person to be measured is placed before a camera, and between them is introduced a network that is photographed at the same time and serves as a standard. Certain artifices are necessary to obtain a complete result; thus the armpits, etc., must be indicated by objects visible from without, and, finally, several views must be taken from various standpoints. The subject is also fitted with a sort of harness, which indicates points of comness, which indicates points of comparison. These points may, however, be marked directly on the person instead. The relative positions of the camera, the network, and the subject are carefully adjusted as that carefully adjusted, so that the subject appears always on the same scale, and then the photograph is taken from the various necessary standpoints.—St. James' Gazette,

LORD STRATHCONA.

Lord Strathcona's features are fa-Lord Strathcona's features are familiar enough to Canadians, but this latest photograph will be interesting. We have reason to know him as our wealthiest citizen, the president of our largest ank, our High Commissioner in Great Britain, the Chancellor of our second university, and one of the few Canadians who have attained to the honor of a seat in the British House of Lords. We have known him as munificent with his known him as munificent with



LORD STRATHOONA AND MOUNT ROYAL his benefactions appealed so widely to public spirit as did his equipment, at his private expense, of 400 mounted rough riders for service in South Africa during the late war. It was a long stride that from the stripling of eighteen exiled for thirteen long years on the bleak coasts of Labrador, an ill-paid clerk in a company, to the peer of the realm with his millions, able to bear the weight of so princely an offering as that which gave him a reputation as wide as the Empire.

In England, it may be interesting to note, Lord Strathcona lives, while out of London, at Knebworth, one of the most famous old mansions of Hertfordshire, with a history dating hack as far as the Norman conquest, though as the ancestral home of Lord Lytton, the author, it is not without an interest more modern. Knebworth survived a stormy transition from a Norman fortress held by Endo Dapifor at the Conquest, to become one of the most picturesque of Elizabethan mansions, where Queen Bess delighted to visit Sir Rowland de Lytton about the time of the Armada. It was owned in turn by Thomas de Brotherton, fifth son of Edward I.; the noted Sir Walter de Manny; Anne, wife of John de Hastings, Earl of Pembroke; Sir John de Hortoff, Treasurer of the household of Henry VI.; Sir Thomas Isourchier, Knight of the Garter, and Sir William de Lytton, Governor of Boulogne. Like most historic houses of its kind, its principal apartments are the banquet hall, oak drawingroom, library, and the oak armoryroom, where, in the days of Charles I., Pym, Eliot and Hampden were often entertained by Sir William Lytton. The whole mansion is crowded with trophics, armors and priceless

ton. The whole mansion is crowded with trophies, armors and priceless memorials of historic days and deeds, But of more interest to Canadians than its specimens of Italian and But of more interest to Canadians than its specimens of Italian and Dutch art, its famous music gallery connecting with its round tower, where John Hampden slept, is the human interest attached to the old place as the home of the poet, novelist, essayist, Lord Lytton, author and poet. The old place has its ghost, an uncanny housewife, who on occasions is said to bring her spinning-wheel to Knebworth, and the drone of its weird music strikes terror to its hearers when impending disaster hangs over the house of Lytton. The domain of Knebworth, church, village greensward, fern-bedecked hills, the odorous grasses and waving reeds beside the lake, the majestic avenues of the park, with oaks that whisper of dead centuries, and ty clinging like romance itself to every crook and cranny, make an ensemble fit to thrill the soul of the most prosaic visitor.


