THE LATEST REPORTS

Quakes and Fire Kill 200 People—One Thousand Injured—Property Loss \$100,000,000

WATER SUPPLY WAS CUT OFF AND FIRE BROKE OUT

San Francisco, April 19.—Earthquake and fire yesterday put nearly half of San Francisco in ruins. At least 200 persons have been killed, a thousand injured, and the property loss will exceed \$100,000,000. Thousands of persons are omeless and destitute, and all day long streams of persons have been fleeing to places of safety. It was 5.15 yesterday morning when

a terrible earthquake shock shook the whole city and surrounding country. One shock apparently lasted two min-utes, and there was almost immediately collapse of flimsy structures all over the

The dreadful earthquake shock came without warning, its motion apparently being from east to west. At first the upheaval of the earth was gradual, but in a few seconds it increased in intensity. Chimneys began to fall and buildings to crack, tottering from their

The people became panic stricken, and rushed into the streets, most of them in their night attire. They were met by showers of falling buildings, cornices, and walls.

Many Crushed to Death. Many were instantly crushed to death, while others were dreadfully mangled. Those who remained indoors generally escaped with their lives, though scores were hit by detached plaster, pictures, and articles thrown to the floor by the shock.

It is believed that more or less loss.

was sustained by nearly every family in the city. The water supply was cut off and

when fires broke out in various sections there was nothing to do but let the buildings burn. Telegraph and telephone communication was shut off for a time. The Western Union was put completely out of business and the Postal Company was the only one that managed to get a wire out of the city. About 10 o'clock even the Postal was forced to suspend. Electrical power was stopped and street cars did not run. Railroads and ferry boats also ceased

Raliroads and ferry boats also ceased operations.

Fires Rage All Day.

The various fires raged all day and the fire department was powerless to do anything except dynamite buildings threatened. All day long explosions shook the city and added to the terror of the inhabitants. of the inhabitants.

Banks and commercial houses, sup-posed to be fireproof, though not of modern build, burned quickly, and the roar of the flames could be heard even on the hills.

Here, many thousands of people con-gregated and viewed the awful scene. Great sheets of fame rose high in the beavens or rushed down some narrow street, joining midway between the

The dense smoke that arose from the fire districts spread out like an immense funnel and could have been seen miles out at sea. Occasionally, as some drug house or place stored with chemicals was reached, most fantastic effects were produced by the colored flames and smoke, which rolled out against the darker background.

Following the first shock, there was another within five minutes, but not nearly so severe. Three hours later there was another slight quake.

Great Damage.

San Jose, 50 miles south, lost many buildings, and from 15 to 20 persons were killed. The annex of the Vendome Hotel collapsed and the fires broke out. Stanford University and Palo Alto suffered. At Stanford many of the handsome buildings were demolished and two persons were killed. One of them was Julius Hanna of Bradford, Pa., and the other was Otto Gurts, a fireman. Six other students are lying The present condition of the room they are forced to work in is hardly fit surroundings for anyone. The room is in a very filthy state, filled with old bottles, and the floors are covered with a coating of dust almost an inch thick in places. The room is a disgrace to such an upto-date building as Harrison Hall is supposed to be.

Drowned In wins.

The Valencia Hotel, a four-storey wooden building, sank into the basement, a pile of splintered timbers under which were pinned many dead and dying occupants of the house, of whom there were 70. The basement was full of water, and some of the

helpless victims were drowned. A house on 14th street, near Valencia, was wrecked, killing two persons. A lodging house on Seventh street, known as the Kingsley, entirely collapsed, and took fire, and 75 to 80 persons are believed to have been buried

in the flaming ruins.

At 18th and Valencia streets there is a crevasse in the street six feet wide, and entire sidewalks torn up. The street car tracks are badly twisted all through the southern section of the city,

and traffic is at a standstill.

Military in Possession.

At 9 a. m. a thousand men from Presido arrived to patrol the down town streets. The 13th infantry, 1,000 strong, arrived from Angel Island and went on patrol duty. The soldlers have been ordered to shoot down thieves caught in the act of robbing the dead and to guard with their lives the millions of

dollars' worth of property placed in the streets to escape the flames. The First California Artillery, 200 strong, two companies, has been de-tailed to patrol duty, on Ellis street.

Great Buildings Destroyed.

The following is an incomplete list of the buildings destroyed or injured: Call building, entirely destroyed, Claus Spreckers building, gutted by flames; Hearst building, collapsed; new Chronicle building, hardly damaged at Chronicle building, hardly damaged at all: Winchester Hotel, Third street, totally destroyed by shock; Grand Opera House, entirely destroyed; Claus Spreckels house and stables, Vanness avenue, badly damaged and will have to be largely rebuilt; St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Vanness avenue, will have to be pulled down; Mechanics Library, building, Post street, cornices fell to street, building, Market and Post streets, slightly damaged, principally around light shaft; Lick House, walls and roof largely caved in; Upham building, Pine and Battery street, totally destroyed, loss \$\$50.000; fire house, adjoining Callfornia Hotel on Bush street, Chief Sulfornia Hotel on Bush street, Chief Sul fornia Hotel on Bush street, Chief Sullivan and wife sleeping in engine house, severely bruised by bricks crashing through the roof from hotel; California Hotel, Bush street, upper walls collapsed and upper floors wrecked. The Quake In Canada Toronto, April 19.-From north to south and from east to west the contin-ent of America felt the shock. California alone suffered, but ad-

well recorded by the seismograph at the Toronto Observatory. The first earth tremors reached Toronto four minutes and 36 seconds after the reported time of the quake at San Fran-cisco, and the larger surface waves were recorded after an interval of 23 minutes and 16 seconds, indicating a velocity of 3.3 kilometres per second. The amplitude of the swing of the Toronto pendulum was about 20 millimetres, showing a tilting of the stone pillar on which the instrument rests of nearly 18 seconds of arc."

Felt at Ottawa, Too.

At 1 o'clock a bulletin from Ottawa read:

"The vibrations resulting from the "The vibrations resulting from the quake at San Francisco were recorded by the seismograph at the Dominion Observatory at the Central Experimental Farm. The preliminary tremors began at eight hours nine minutes 30 seconds in the morning. The principal part of the disturbance occurred at 8 hours 30 minutes 30 seconds and the maximum disturbance at 8.35.

Swept Clean by Fire.

The latest reports at police head-quarters show that the entire district surrounded by Valleja, Howard East and Sansome streets, embracing practically the wholesale portion of the city, has been swept clean by the fire that the tested by Market, Eighth, and Folsom streets has been devastated. In the latter district are most of the city's finest and most substantial buildings. The area covered by the fiames up to the present time is about eight square miles, or several hundred city blocks. Very little, if any, water, is available, and the blowing up of buildings by dynamite is the only means of checking the fiames.

A portion of the new city hall, which cost over \$7,000,000, collapsed, the root sifting into the court yard and smaller towers tumbling down. The great dome was moved, but did not fall.
