Earncliffe Gardens.

"Earncliffe Gardens," the fine property of Mr W. C. Archibald, this town, is a most interesting place to visit just now.

Mr Archibald purchased this property about twenty years ago, when it was simply pasture-land, and this year he is able to see in a large measure the fruition of his hopes and the return for the large amount of time and money expended upon it.

The thousands of plum trees are loaded with fruit which will soon be ready for picking.

Mr Archibald claims to have one-eighth of the crop of Nova Scotia. His apple trees are also full of fruit and will probably give him 500 barrels.

Mr Archibald has thirty varieties of plums, and on request sent this year to England a number of scions from his trees. Mr Archibald pays considerable attention to the growth of garden shrubbery and has probably the largest collection in Nova Scotia, to which continual additions are being made.

Among a host of others he has paragon clematis, perimmons and neourines growing and fruiting. He also engages largely in the culture of standard, half standard and dwarf roses from which this year he has put out one thousand cuttings which at the present time are doing well.

"Earncliffe Gardens" are well worth a visit, and those who go will be surprised at what they see. The enterprising proprietor has not, however, attained the point aimed at, which is to see established here a large nursery which will be able to supply at least the maritime provinces with all that is needed. We wish him every success.
