Sir Wilfrid and the Navy.

By Reviewer. Sir Premier Laurier is perhaps the only living man who could lay his hand upon his heart, strike a noble pose, and declare in ringing words: "So long as I have the honor to represent the Liberal party I will never appeal to the passions and the prejudices of my fellow citizens."

He says "our share of the obligation of nationhood is to relieve Great Britain of the necessity of safeguarding our shores." The ingenious way in which truth and falsehood are here combined to favor a false conclusion commands admiration.

So long as the British navy is supreme upon the sea our shores are in danger of attack. Therefore a war vessel anchored at Halifax and another on the shores of British Columbia are not necessary to protect those places. They are already protected by the supremacy of the British navy.

Have we reached the place where we are unable to do our duty to relieve the British navy? And where we can only care by pretending to help with a tinpot expedient like that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier?

The matter of the proposed amendment to the by-law regarding the keeping of pigs was taken up and freely discussed. The outcome was the defining of an area within the town in which the keeping of pigs is prohibited, and a committee composed of the Recorder and Couns. Haycock and Bishop was appointed to prepare a draft of a by-law to be submitted to the Council at its next meeting.

The U. S. Election.

The presidential election in the United States on Tuesday, which was one of the most remarkable political campaigns in the history of that country, resulted in the election of Woodrow Wilson, at present Governor of New Jersey, and one time President of Princeton University.

The most prominent feature of the campaign was the candidature of Ex-President Roosevelt and the large vote which he polled in opposition to the regular candidate of his party, showing what a strong personal following he has throughout the country.

The Late Senator Bell.

We had a personal acquaintance with the late Hon. A. C. Bell, and felt shocked at his untimely death. He was a man of unusual intellectual qualities. He was for some years a member of our Provincial Legislature.

Is Doing Things.

A great change has taken place since the departure of the Laurier Government one year ago. This change is particularly noticeable in the people of the Maritime Provinces, where for fifteen years the leaders of the Liberal party sought to beguile the people with tales of what they intended to do to make the ports of St. John and Halifax truly national and capable of taking care of the ever increasing business which was coming to this.

Help for the Feeble Minded.

A very representative company of the citizens of Wolfville gathered in the chapel of the new Baptist church last Saturday afternoon to listen to an address by Rev. John Wier, of Dartmouth, the organizing secretary of the League for the Care and Protection of the Feeble Minded.

Three years ago carefully compiled statistics placed the number of feeble minded in Nova Scotia, including idiots and imbeciles, at twelve hundred and fifty children and seven hundred adults.

The League seeks to prevent the increase of these much to be pitied creatures by segregating as far as possible the present already too large number, and then by statute to make it impossible for any persons be married who are known to be feeble minded.

Hon. Robt. Rogers has become Minister of Public Works in place of Hon. F. D. Monk; Hon. W. J. Roche succeeds Mr. Rogers as Minister of the Interior; and Mr. Coderre becomes Secretary of State in place of Mr. Roche.
