"GIANTS" AND "WHITE SOX"
PLAN FOR WORLD TOUR

New York, July 2.—The latest plan
for the world tour of the Giants and White
Sox next winter is for the teams and the
accompanying party to charter their own
ship and go all the way around in it.
The idea has been suggested to President
Comiskey by Ban Johnson. "When here
last week the American League president
talked with steamship officials and found
that a vessel could be had. He thinks
about 200 persons would make the trip
in the special boat and says the cost per
person of the trip would be reduced to
about \$1,200. Ban expects to go along,
and if he does will call the annual meeting
of the American League for November
so he can catch the boat. Johnson says
if the ship does go to the Antipodes he
will come from China, as he doesn't
want to be away three or four months.
A warm welcome in foreign lands awaits
the Chicago White Sox and New York
Giants, asserted James A. Hart, former
president of the Chicago Cubs, who has
returned to Chicago from a trip around
the world, traversing part of the route
the globe-trotting base ball team will fol-
low. He predicted an enthusiastic re-
ception of the ball players in all those
nations which already have shown an
interest in the sport, and especially in
Japan, the Philippines, Australia and
France. "Manila will give a great wel-
come to teams," said Mr. Hart. "So
will Australia, if too many games are not
played in one city. In Japan base balls
confined mostly to the colleges, though
I saw small boys playing the game. It
appeals more to the educated classes
than the rank and file, however, so the
work there will be educational rather
than remunerative. There are a number
of leagues in Paris where the game has
a great vogue, and they should draw well.

endeavoring to make the athletic meet to
be held at the Fair grounds July 19th
the best one ever held in Brandon.

Two bicycle races are to be run off
during the meet on the 19th one is a mile
race and the other a three mile race.

handsome trophy shield for the three
mile race and there will also be medals
for first, second and third places in both

CANADIANS IN THE
HENLEY REGATTA

THE "BLUE RIBBON" OF AMATEUR
ROWING WILL BE COMPETED
FOR, AND LIKELY SECURED BY
CANADIAN OARSMEN.

London, July 2.—The annual Henley
regatta opened today and will continue
through the remainder of the week.
No oarsmen of the United States are en-
tered in the regatta this year, but Canada
is better represented than ever before
and it would not be surprising if one of
the coveted trophies was captured by the
Canadians.

Most interest centres in the contest
for the Grand Challenge Cup, which for
seventy-five years has been considered
the "blue ribbon" of amateur rowing.
The trophy is now held by an Australian
crew and was previously won by a Belgian
crew several times. This year an eight
oared crew from the Argonaut Rowing
Club of Toronto will endeavor once more
to score a victory for the Dominion.
The only foreign entry in the Grand
Challenge event is that of the Paris Row-
ing Club.

An Argonaut four is entered for the
Stewards' Challenge Cup, while in the
Diamond Sculls competition the same club
will be represented by their crack single
sculler, Everard R. Butler.
The race for the Diamond Sculls will
bring together many of the foremost am-
ateur single scullers of the entire world.
In addition to the entries from the United
Kingdom the participants will include
representatives of France, Tasmania,
Germany, Russia, Canada, Italy and Mon-
aco.

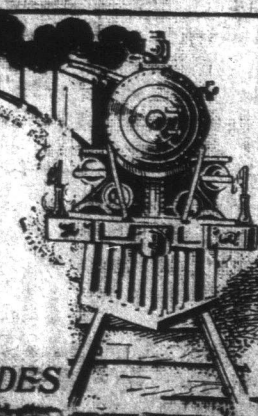
