PROHIBITION CAMPAIGN IS PROGRESSING

Temperance Forces Out in Full
Strength

Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, secretary of the N. B. Temperance Alliance, has been earnestly working in these counties for two or three weeks. Sunday he held meetings at Centerville, Bath and East Florenceville, and meetings at Victoria on Monday evening, at Bristol on Tuesday evening and Jack-
sonville last evening. Tonight he will speak at Debec, tomorrow night at On-Sunday he will hold meetings at Canterbury, on Saturday at Beaton, North Hampton, Upper Woodstock and Lindsay.

Inasmuch as this province votes on the prohibition question on July 10th, Mr. Boothroyd's addresses were listened to with peculiar interest. The main points brought out were: Prohibition should be supported by the voters, first because it has resulted in great improvement in general conditions as compared with the old license days. This is particularly noticeable in the larger centres such as St. John, where, during 1919, under prohibition the number of arrests for drunkenness were nearly four hundred less than during 1918, under license. It was clearly explained that the increase in arrests date from Jan. 1, 1920, on which date the Dominion law forbidding importation from Montreal was lifted, and at once a flood of liquor poured over this province, resulting in greater drunkenness. To arrest this last menace it is necessary to first support the provincial law, second, in the province, then the government of N. B. will request the Dominion government to bring about a prohibition on the importation question in perhaps a car hence, and if the majority oppose importation of liquor from other provinces, such traffic will be ordered to cease. Then prohibition will have a fair chance.

Second, the voters on July 10th should support prohibition law, not that it is at all perfect, so that important amendments may be made to the law, regarding medical prescriptions, wholesale and retail vendors and the lemon extract issue, etc. But the government refuse to allow such amendments until after the people vote in favor of the principle of prohibition.

Warning to vote against the second question on the ballot paper, "Are you in favor of the sale of light wines and beer under government control?" was given by the speaker as he pointed out that this very law is the one supposed to be in force in Montreal, but which has fallen down utterly, yielding an almost free sale of spirits and a heavy crop of drunkenness. The wine and beer law is practically unenforceable, unless there be an analyst attached constantly to every vendor's store. Besides strong beer and so-called light wines make drunks.

Mr. Boothroyd urged strongly the women to be sure to get out and vote, for prohibition concerns women very closely, simply because liquor hurts the home, both the men and the growing boys, and women should vote to protect the home.

FORMER HARTLAND LADY DIES SUDDENLY

Mrs. L. R. Hetherington, Daughter of
Mrs. G. C. Watson
Passed Away

The town was shocked on Monday to learn of the tragically sudden death of Mrs. L. R. Hetherington, only daughter of Mrs. G. C. Watson of Hartland. The deceased lived here with her parents for a number of years and has spent every summer here since her marriage. She is survived by her mother, to whom, alone in her sorrow so far as immediate relatives are concerned, the sympathy of the whole town is outpoured deeply and sincerely. There also remains one brother, Prof. W. F. Watson, now touring Europe.

The remains were brought to Hartland yesterday afternoon and the funeral was held from the United Baptist church.

Hopewell Hill, June 21.—Profound sorrow and regret was caused today by the sudden death of Mrs. Hetherington, wife of L. R. Hetherington, M. A., principal of Riverside Consolidated school who passed away at an early hour this morning. Mrs. Hetherington had been in her usual health yesterday and up to the time of retiring last night had been conversing with friends at her home and feeling as well as usual. About 2 o'clock in the morning she was stricken with heart trouble, passing away a short time after. Mrs. Hetherington had sustained a very serious injury in an automobile accident one year ago and though largely recovering had never fully regained her former vigor. She was formerly Miss Laura Watson of Hartland, and was well known throughout the province in connection with temperance work and was of a particularly christian character that manifested itself in many forms of good work.

She had recently been president of the Provincial Women's Christian Temperance Union and had been prominently connected with some of the Temperance and W. C. T. U. and as an officer in the latter body had attended supreme branch of the order in Europe. She was possessed of marked literary tastes and as a writer and speaker had far above ordinary ability.

Since coming to Albert county she had taken a deep interest in church, Sunday school and temperance work and will be greatly missed. In her death prohibition, now prominently before the people, has lost a devoted supporter.
