## Local and other Matters.

### THE GREAT TORT CASE.

On Friday, Justice B. Read's Court-room contained an eager throng, many of whom were attracted by the prospect of imbibing lessons in the subtleties of legal wisdom, and others allured by the forensic display in the suit of Pascal Cormier vs. Palmer and Cahill. The latter were sued in legal parlance "in an action of tort for assault and damage." When the case was called, the Plaintiff appeared in person, his Counsel (in the legal Norman language) being *non comparuit* in person. The Plaintiff freely dissembling the aspersion in the crowd that he "had turned chicken" in fear of the legal gladiators from Tantram opposing. The Court, however, appeared to hold the opinion that the Counsel's question had no connection with the merits of the case, the investigation of which was not stimulated by the transfer of a five dollar bill to the Counsel's pocket, and it appeared that Pascal had omitted this rather important preliminary. The evidence of the first witness—the Plaintiff himself—was short and to the point. He had been at Dochester. He had returned to the New Brunswick House. He was cold. He went into the bar-room. He was shoved against the door casing. His face was bruised. Some days later he went to see Dr. Moore. The Dr. said no bones were broken, but it would be some time before he was as good a man as he was before. Mr. Palmer objected to the case proceeding further, as the witness had left the Court room. The Court refused to allow the case to proceed, and the Plaintiff was ordered to pay the costs of the case, which Mr. Palmer argued long and ably was irregular, also that the summons had been altered after it was issued, as was seen in the handwriting, and also that the Plaintiff, who were contending for great earnestness and learning. The Court held another opinion on the matter and decided that Mr. Palmer was entirely out of order. 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
