

BAD ROADS AGAIN

To the Editor of The Gleaner.
Dear Sir,—I am a subscriber to The Daily Gleaner I am quite naturally interested in all items appearing in it, especially the People's Column. Now, friend readers, before you should read any farther, you would surely guess where the writer hails from. I am a Scotch Laker, yes, and not ashamed of it.

As I was reading The Gleaner to night I noticed an article written by a man from McAdam Junction complaining of the bad condition of a certain road in his section. So I just prompted me to say a few words about the conditions in my district.

The road I am referring to is the road from Bear Island, through Scotch Lake to Springfield, another, the road leading from Scotch Lake to Scotch Settlement, better known as the Allen road. Some sections of the latter are almost impassable, while the former is nearly as bad.

At Bear Island they have "good roads. Why? Simply because Mr. Veniot wishes to please the man with the car not the farmers, oh, no! I bet you Mr. Veniot, the farmers are the bread and life of this province and they should at least be given a decent road to travel on.

At Springfield they have not good roads, and the people of Springfield should feel thankful to have an energetic, enterprising road supervisor like Mr. Rankin Moore.

Now this section of road between Bear Island and Springfield is only a distance of about eight miles and there are five or six gravel pits on it. It is the kind of road we farmers need. A good turnpiked road, well graded and ditched to provide proper drainage. I am very much in favor of concrete culverts, as I think they are as near permanent as a culvert can be made. The old log culverts are too expensive, so to speak.

Why is Quebec the most envied province in the Dominion? Simply because they have good roads and a corps of capable men to see to it that the roads are made right and proper.

I hope the time will soon come when our road supervisors will be required to write examinations to qualify for their work, the same as the forest rangers and school teachers, etc., are required to do.

I hope that some of the "powers that be" will see this epistle of mine, and that it will help to jog their memories a little as to our most needed accommodation.

We are all a very human lot of people here, but I am a little doubtful as to whether that awfully nice Jean Foster Government is for us or not.
