THE WEATHER

Toronto, June 26.—Pressure is low over the greater part of the continent with a depression centered over Lake Superior moving eastward. The weather has been decidedly warm in Ontario with some heavy thunderstorms in southern and western districts. It has been milder in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces and unsettled with scattered showers in the west. Maritime—Moderate winds, partly cloudy; probably scattered showers. NEW ICE CREAM PLANT

Purity Ice Cream Company's New Plant Sample of Scrupulous Cleanliness. A visit to the recently opened manufacturing and distributing plant of the Purity Ice Cream Company, located on Campbell street above Westmorland, would reveal a small boy's paradise which would equally be the envy of all housewives in its scrupulous cleanliness. With a freezing capacity of 600 gallons per day even Dad would appreciate the superiority of electricity in preference to muscle power to turn the "freezer". This new plant, which has been built and placed in operation this season under the management of Robert Dayton, has been erected for the purpose of establishing a manufacturing and shipping center which will relieve the St. John plant by taking care of the business from here north, including River du Loup, Campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle, Chatham and intermediate points. Twelve men will be employed when the plant is placed in full operation while two motor trucks will be employed in local distribution and transport. The "mix" which is frozen here is brought from St. John, where it has been prepared under the most sanitary conditions. Placed in the freezer here the preparation is kept scrupulously free from air, dust and germs by the use of compressed carbonic acid gas until the finished ice cream is ready for distribution. Throughout the entire process the utmost in sanitary conditions prevail.

THREE ADDRESSES FOR BARON BYNG ON HIS ARRIVAL HERE

Governor General Will Also Be Presented With the Freedom of City

ONE REPLY FOR THE THREE ADDRESSES

Expect Five Hundred People to Attend Reception and State Ball

Preparations for the visit of His Excellency the Governor General, Baron Byng of Vimy, to Fredericton on Tuesday next on his tour of New Brunswick and the other Maritime Provinces are being rapidly completed. His Excellency will be met upon arrival of his special train at the C. N. R. station at 12 o'clock noon and escorted to City Hall, where the public ceremonies in connection with the official welcome to the city and province will take place. Three addresses of welcome and the freedom of the city will be presented on this occasion; Mayor Reid will officiate on behalf of the City, Premier Veniot will present the address of welcome on behalf of the Provincial Government, and the third address of welcome will be that from the Provincial Command of the Great War Veterans' Association of New Brunswick. The three addresses will then be replied to by His Excellency, who will make but one speech in reply. Invitations have been issued by the Senate and the Faculty of the University of New Brunswick for the special Convocation to be held during the afternoon in the College Library when an honorary degree of LL. D. will be conferred by the University upon His Excellency, who will afterwards lay the corner stone of the new Memorial Building of the University. It is probable that the convocation will be preceded by a special meeting of the University Senate during the morning, although the necessary arrangements for the conferring of the honorary degree were completed at the Executive meeting of the Senate. The ceremonies will take place in the Opera House rather than the City Council Chambers by a special meeting of at least five hundred people at the State Hall and Reception at the Parliament Buildings in the evening.

BURT'S CORNER MAN GOES TO JAIL FOR TEN MONTHS

Four Months For Selling and Six Months for Having Still in Possession

CHARGE AGAINST WOMAN WITHDRAWN

Defendant Decides to Serve Long Sentence Rather Than Pay \$300

Clarence Burt, of Burt's Corner, who pleaded guilty to two charges preferred against him in the Police Court yesterday following a recent raid at Burt's Corner where a still and mash were seized by Inspector Fraser Saunders and Ed Duffie at the home of his mother, Mrs. Alonzo Burt, has started to serve the sentence, totalling ten months, which was imposed as an option to fines totalling \$300. The prisoner was conveyed last evening to the York County Jail to commence his sentence. Yesterday morning before Police Magistrate Limerick, Burt pleaded guilty to a charge of selling liquor illegally, a fine of \$100 or four months being imposed. A second charge under the Inland Revenue Act, which was brought against the mother in whose home the moonshining apparatus had been located locked in a harmless looking box, was commenced also yesterday but was dropped when the information was changed to apply to the son, who also pleaded guilty to the charge. A fine of \$200 with a six months' option was imposed in this instance, to become effective upon the expiration of the first penalty. Filling.
