

ROY GUILTY.

OF ST. JOHN'S, QUEBEC.

Making False Returns-Usad the Funds to Bolster Up Hi Own Enterprises—Included Worthless Notes and Other Paper in the Returns to the Government as As-

Montreal, May 27 .- Hon. P. H. Roy, ex-Speaker of the Quebec Legislature and ex-President of the Bank of St. John's, was found guilty to-day of wilfully making false returns to the Gov-

This verdict is the result of one of the most sensational trials in the history of this province. During the three weeks the trial has been in progress some remarkable evidence was submitted in reference to Mr. Roy's action. It was shown that he had made false returns to the Government involving some \$500,000. This consisted of worthless notes, past due bills and bills payable, which Mr. Roy, his brother and their friends had discounted, pocketing the cash. In their reports to the Government all this worthless paper was set down as assets. In the list of current loans was included an item of \$5,000 represented by a note of the bank itself, which was made to cover money stolen from it.

a note of the bank itself, which was made to cover money stolen from it.
At to-day trial Mr. Girard, counsel for Mr. Roy, made a plea for the accused, and in the face of the damaging evidence it was a remarkably able plea. He was followed by Mr. Demers, for the Crown, who dwett particularly upon the false returns made to the Government. At the conclusion Judge Monet summed up the evidence and addressed the jury, who then retired, and in twenty minutes returned with a verdict of guilty. guilty. Crown Prosecutor Hibbard then asked

Crown Prosecutor Hibbard then asked for the pronouncement of sentence, but Mr. Girard asked for a reserved case. It was decided to hear the argument in this to-morrow morning, but it is almost a foregone conclusion that the objections of Mr. Girard will be rejected, and sentence will be pronounced to-morrow.

Only two days ago Mr. Roy tried to shoot himself in the head, but only succeeded in wounding himself in the foot.

As a result of the wrecking of the bank the depositors, most of whom are farmers and working people, will be heavy losers.


