Barnum and Charles Allison are clearing the forest reserve of the Toiy-abe range of wild horses. The first nine days they secured seventy-six head and a week later captured ninety more. They have erected corrals of woren wire near water holes and drive the horses into them. There are thousands of wild horses in that section which destroy the range.
