part of the coast would, of course, be easy for the conveyance of supplies, reinforcements, and trees the heavy train of the army. The Russian, in the contrary, would have to bring the whole of the immense steppes of the southern provinces of the empire. Nicholaisw and Chemon could be blockaded so as to stoy all communication by water, and, if Sebiantopol were invested by sea and land, Russia has, no other piece of strength in the country to fail back upon. The conduct of a siege is an affair of art, which must be successful in a given time, unless the enemy can relieve the place in the interval by defeating the besieging army or by compelling if to retire. From the best accounts which have been obtained of Sebastopol there is no reason to suppose that the land defences of the place are of a very formidable characters, or that much has been done to them until the present heatilities gave the Emperor reason to apprehend an attack by European armise. The position of the harbour, and their fire would probably not touch operations commenced in the rear of the place and on higher ground. We cannot, therefore, but suppose that 40,000 men of the allied armise, supported by the fleets, would be able to keep in check any umber of troops Russia can throw into the Crimes, and we are confirmed in hoping that this is the operation reacted upon by the allied governments, by the fact that very heavy hattering guns have been despatched both from the English and French arsenals. In fact, however, breaching batteries of ordance far above the ordinary calibre might easily be constructed with guns lauded from the ships, which have an overwhelming superiority of metal, and could furnish a battering train of extraordinary power. The next movements of the Russian army on the Danube and the fate of Silistria, upon the arrival or the allied troops at Varna, will determine whether Prince Gortschakfof or Marshall St. Arnaud is to asume the effects of the case, the primary on invasion; but if, as the last accounts would lead us to believe
