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FOREIGN NEWS.

The "Times" on the United States Elections.
The "Times" of London, in its issue of the 14th inst., contains a long and able article on the results of the late American elections. It is a most interesting and valuable contribution to the knowledge of the state of the United States.

AFGHAN AFFAIR STILL UNSETTLED.
The Afghan war continues to be a source of anxiety to the British Government. The Russian troops are still in the country, and the British forces are still engaged in the struggle.

Second Russian Line of Defence at Constantinople.
The Russian army has been reinforced at Constantinople, and a second line of defence has been established. This move is considered a significant step towards the defence of the city.

Russia States that She will Honorably Fulfill the Treaty of Berlin.
The Russian Government has declared its intention to honorably fulfill the Treaty of Berlin. This statement is a clear indication of Russia's commitment to the terms of the treaty.

Manchester, Nov. 7.—The Guardian's London correspondent says:—Before the plenipotentiaries left Berlin Earl Beaconsfield and Count Assoluto had a long conversation, providing that if Russia should endeavor to remain on Turkish territory after May 15th, England would not be bound to respect that territory.

Rome, Nov. 7.—The Pioneer states that the Albanians in the Rhyber Pass are deserting largely in consequence of sickness and hunger. Hopes are entertained that the British demands will be met, and that the Albanians at Jellabak are from thirty to forty daily.

London, Nov. 7.—A Berlin despatch says:—It seems certain that several thousand former Russian soldiers and officers have been permitted to volunteer and start for Afghanistan.

Moscow, Nov. 7.—An ex-soldier has attempted to assassinate Gen. Bogdan, formerly Minister of War. The General was unhurt, and the assassin has been arrested.

Lord Justice Christian of the Court of Appeals in Ireland, has resigned on account of increasing disability of hearing.

The St. Sulpice Seminary has given notice of its intention to appeal from the decision of Judge Belanger in the Oka case.
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The ocean vessels at Montreal are being hurriedly laden with the object of getting them out of the St. Lawrence as soon as possible.
Hon. Edward Blake, and Mr. Lucy Mackenzie, have been appointed to the *Venez*, arrived at Quebec on Saturday morning.

George Foster, defaulting treasurer of the St. Lawrence, has been sentenced to twelve years in the penitentiary and a fine of \$50,000 and costs.
R. L. despatch reports that some half-dozen of the rooms of the steamer *Massachusetts* were robbed on Thursday night of watches and pocket books.

A Berlin despatch says Bismarck has sent a circular to the Federal Governments, by the Duke of Cambridge, Prince Leopold, left the St. Pancreas, accompanied by a commission with a view to the increase of the tariff.

Nearly all the newly elected members of the House of Commons have now applied for seats, but no arrangements can be made until the seats of the Ministers have been vacated.

The English Express.
London, Nov. 7.—Knight & Son, merchants, of London and Liverpool, have failed. Liability, £100,000.

Robert Forrester, a well-known proprietor at Glasgow, has failed.
The liabilities of Robert Forrester, of Glasgow, whose failure has been announced, are estimated at half a million to two and a half million dollars.

It is stated that Sir A. T. Galt is at Ottawa for the purpose of presenting the Canadian case in the preparation of the information of the British Foreign Office.
The *London Standard* says:—The *Forfallo* has been compelled to retreat before the attack of the English, but were repulsed.

The Marquis of Lorne has desired Col. Littleton to intimate to Col. Stevenson, President of the Board of Trade, that he will be pleased to attend the proposed ball in his honour at the Windsor Hotel.

Cardinal Cullen's successor.
London, Nov. 12.—A despatch from Rome reports that the Very Rev. Monsignor Cullen, Vicar-General of the Archdiocese of Toronto, has been appointed to succeed to the Archbishopric, and will probably be made a Cardinal.

Labour Troubles.
London, Nov. 10.—Nearly half of the cotton mills in the Ashton-under-Lyne district have stopped in consequence of the depression of trade, and many are running on short time.

London, Nov. 13.—The iron firms of Ashton, Hyde, Staleybridge, Newton, and Guidebridge have given notice of their intention to reduce the wages of their workmen two shillings a week, and of unskilled workmen one shilling after November 14th.

The cotton manufacturers of Glasgow have reduced the working hours one-third. This will affect 30,000 operatives.
The Boston cotton spinnings have decided to make a reduction of 5 per cent. on the wages of the operatives.

A New Industry for Ottawa.
Ottawa, Nov. 11.—The draft of an agreement between the city of Ottawa and Mr. Teale, woolen manufacturer of Utah, N.Y., has been prepared. By this agreement Mr. Teale proposes to establish a large manufacturing plant, giving employment to 100 operatives, at least, who are residents in the city limits, providing that the balance of 50 per cent. of the operatives are to be from the city of Ottawa.

Mr. Henry Bessemer writes to the London Times complaining of the injustice of not allowing English exhibitors at Paris to send their goods to the Exhibition in the same way as the French exhibitors.
The Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour has been conferred on Mr. J. C. Turner, managing editor of the *Evening Telegraph*, Norwich, (Conn., myriads disappeared on Tuesday. He was seen for hearing against Lady, a girl having a tooth extracted, which had caused some trouble with his head.

A special from Utah to St. Paul says:—A man named Robert Sherman, who has been seized by the Salt Lake Dominion officials for wrecking in Canadian waters. The gang was taken to the steamer *Magnum*, and ground for some days in the Magnetic ship.

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THE MARQUIS OF LORNE'S VISIT TO AMERICA.
