The French Academy has lately discovered that some plants are as sensitive to the effects of alcohol as man.

It is said that if soil laid is ploughed just before the seed is sown, the soil will feed upon the seed and not injure the corn.

Ten millions of cattle are annually slaughtered in this country to supply the home demand for meat, which is valued at \$400,000,000.

The Courier de San Francisco speaks of three vines near Sonoma, Cal., 50 years of age, which yielded this year 100 pounds of grapes.

In midwinter, when the weather is cold, corn is the best food for promoting plumpness in the young of the pig.

An Oregon farmer made considerable syrup from watermelon last year. The melons were run through a cider mill, and the juice strained.

Two or three acres of corn will supply a Western family with a winter's fuel. The same corn sold and turned into wood or coal would supply fuel for a month.

The repeated application to copper or brass of alternate washes of diluted acetic acid and exposure to the fumes of ammonia will give a fine antique finish.
