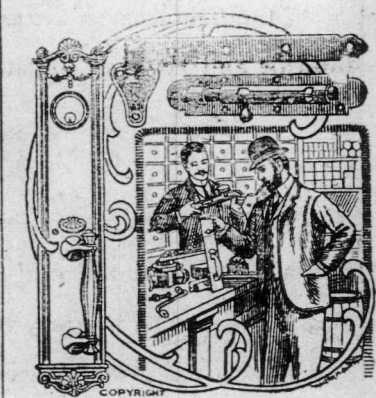

LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS.

Word comes from Ottawa that Hon. Mr. Brodeur, Minister of Marine is seriously ill. He is said to be suffering from intestinal hemorrhage.

Five buildings, containing 14,000 bushels of potatoes at Eastern Station Maine were destroyed by fire. The loss is \$25,000.

Three deaths and injuries to more than 200 persons are reported as the result of falls on the slippery pavements in New York.

The renowned Cardinal Sallati, well known in America, where he resided for several years, died in Rome on Saturday last, after an illness of some months. He was in his 71st year.

Three hundred persons came up to Matheson, Ont., on Friday on their way to the Porcupine gold field. Most of the prospectors have blankets with them and are used to the vicissitudes of a gold rush.

The residents of Sydney have decided in favor of the city granting generous concessions for the establishment of a big rolling mill plant there, employing five hundred men, and costing half a million dollars.

Word comes from Las Palmas, Canary Islands, that a violent gale has devastated the entire island of Francelina, destroying many houses and ruining the banana and other crops. The damage is heavy.

The new Oceanic Company's Liners, Olympic and Titanic will be sixty thousand tons each, twice the size of the Manzanilla. Work on both steamers is being rushed.

There was a dearth of eggs in New York last week. So fresh eggs were reaching the market that they were almost impossible to get them at any price. The retail price for the best ranged from 80 to 70 cents. The wholesale price was 50 cents.

Mr. Wilton, Assistant Chief of Provincial Survey, who has returned to Toronto from the Porcupine Country says that the richness of the minerals beats anything that has been seen except Cobalt itself.

The late Alfred Jones, head of the Eldor Dempster Steamship Co., who died recently in London left the bulk of his fortune of \$2,500,000 for charitable objects and for research into the cause of disease on the West Coast of Africa.

General Pedro Diaz, who started out Friday for Managua Nicaragua to treat for peace with President Madriz met with a tragic end on the Giron bar. A canoe in which he was attempting to make a landing was caught by a gigantic wave and broke amidships. General Diaz immediately disappeared from view in the turbulent sea.

It is stated in the Canadian Pacific Railway's headquarters in Montreal that with 1760 miles added to its system during the past year, it has taken the premier place for mileage among the railroads of this continent. It now has 10,445 miles of road in Canada and nearly 5,000 in the United States.

North Bay Ont., was ravaged by a fire on Friday last, which started in the tailor shop of Mr. J. J. O'Connell, and spread with lightning rapidity. The alarm was hardly given when an explosion occurred which worked havoc in the Angus store. A gasoline tank used for lighting purposes exploded. Mr. Angus and his son Robert, who were in the back part of the store, were among the debris from explosion and were dragged out unconscious.

Three little children were frozen to death at Yellow-Grass, near Regina Sask., last week while going from their home to visit their grandparents two miles away. Sheriff Whitebear of Winnipeg is missing and fears are entertained that he has perished. Lawrence Thombley, sixteen years old, was frozen to death near Estevan Manitoba. He went to look for the horses and failed to return.

The first fatality to result from the Suffragette disturbances occurred at Leeds, England on the 5th inst., when Alfred Hudson, a postman, died from the injuries received during a riot on August 10th last. Sir Edward Grey was addressing the meeting inside the building. An attempt on the part of a force of suffragettes to enter precipitated a riot in which Hudson was injured.

Thomas Russell, homesteader, was hauling coal with a friend during last week, near Saskatoon Sask., in a storm when the horses gave out, the man unhitched and mounted their horses. The worried animals, however, could not make any headway, so Russell's partner went ahead to secure help for his friend, but he lost his way and it was three or four miles before he reached the shack. By the time the rescue party found Russell he was frozen to death. Two other men are also reported missing.

Owing to strained relations between the Electric Lighting Co., and the Town Council, Summerside was in darkness the latter part of last week. The council positively refused to renew the contract with the company at the figure they submitted and on Wednesday night the lights were shut off. The Agriculturalist says: Just where the matter will end does not seem quite clear. But so far as can be learned neither side is disposed to yield to the other and we are likely to have unlighted streets for some time to come. The situation is certainly a disagreeable one. It is bad for the town and bad for the electric light people whose best customer the town was. The people are favorable to the town owning its own electric light plant, and expressed themselves at the last civic election. The present trouble may lead to some such movement being undertaken. In the meantime the town will be as dark as it was before.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

We are indebted to the Plant Line Steamship Company for a large and excellent calendar for 1910.

During the blizzard Monday a shorting engine and a snow plow collided at St. Lawrence N. S. and John McIntosh was killed.

Fire wiped out the Windsor Hotel, Cockburn Block, Post Office, and damaged several other buildings at Sturgeon Falls, Ont. The total damage amounts to about \$75,000.

Three persons were killed and one injured in a collision in the Texas freight yards at Shreveport, La., between a switch engine and a westbound passenger train. The sleeping car port was fatally hurt.

Delagrang, the French aviator, whose achievements during the past two years won for him a high place among those who have set out to conquer the air, was instantly killed at Byrdston on the 5th, while making a flight in the presence of a great crowd.

Four persons were burnt to death in Babcock's Boarding House at Fort William, Ont., on the 5th. Five others were seriously injured by jumping from the windows, and the eleven remaining occupants escaped in their night clothes into an atmosphere 30 degrees below zero.

The four-year-old daughter of John Edward engaged with his wife in a lumbercamp back of Searchmont, Ont. got hold of a box of widely advertised pills and ate the entire contents, dying shortly after in convulsions. An inquest is likely to be held.

Twenty thousand miners were idle on the 5th in the Northumberland coal district of England as a consequence of the dispute over the eight hours a day Act, which became effective on January 1st. The men at the collieries which were still active gave notice that they would quit.

The customs tobacco stores at Alexandria, Egypt containing tobacco to the value of nearly \$5,000,000 was gutted by fire on New Year's Day. Firemen assisted by 200 sailors from the German cruiser Freya succeeded in saving the greater part of the tobacco. The loss is estimated at \$1,500,000.

George Mann, inspector for the Bradley Lumber Co., of Hamilton, was instantly killed by No. 25 M. C. R. express one mile east of Hagersville, Ont., Monday afternoon. He had been to the house east to inspect lumber and was walking back on the track. He did not notice the approach of the train.

Fire at Meredith, New Hampshire, on the 4th inst., destroyed the hotel which was kept by James Lydian and family of Charlottetown. It was a bitter cold night, the temperature being twenty degrees below zero, and the inmates, who were hurriedly turned out of their beds, suffered a great deal from cold and exposure.

Shortly after midnight Sunday flames were discovered bursting from the lower floor of the home of Christian Brothers in Montreal, while thirty members of the community were sleeping in the upper story. Fighting through flames and smoke, the thirty Brothers, with slings and scorpions, narrowly escaped being burned to death in their beds.

Serious results attended a slip on the part of J. F. Scholtes, aged 25 years, a piano mover, while carrying a piano up the steps of a Logan avenue house Toronto on Monday. The steps were icy and when Scholtes slipped the heavy instrument fell on his neck and shoulders. His shoulder was dislocated and his skull fractured and internal injuries are feared. Scholtes may die.

Six devoted Gray Nuns from Montreal passed through Winnipeg on Monday on their way to Isle La Crosse, a mission in the northern wilds. To reach their destination the sisters have to travel over snow-covered roads, through heavy bush and across ice-covered rivers and after a few nights, being beyond civilization, they must sleep in the open air, exposed to arctic cold.

When the Grand Trunk express from the East arrived at Woodstock, Ont., on Monday at five thirty, a man was found hanging on the front of the engine. When rescued he was unable to talk coherently, but from what can be gathered from his utterance he was struck by the locomotive and thrown upward to the cowcatcher, where he saved his life by hanging on until that city was reached. He suffered severe internal injuries from which he may not recover.

There was a serious fire in Hull, P. Q. opposite Ottawa, Monday morning which destroyed St. John Baptiste School and several children were hurt. There was a thousand pupils in the school which has but one fire escape. When the alarm was given a panic started in one of the rooms. The children crowded to the escape and several were trampled on and painfully injured. Eventually all were gotten out without any loss of life. The building was valued at \$50,000.

The Montreal new typhoid Emergency Hospital, which has been rendered indispensable owing to the recent epidemic in that city, was opened on Tuesday of last week when the down state of the transformed factory was sufficiently finished to admit patients, and six acute cases were brought in. Since then the capacity of the building has been taxed to accommodate the patients constantly arriving. Lord Strathcona, Canadian High Commissioner in London has cabled \$25,000 to the committee in charge of the hospital, and has offered \$100,000 more to start a fund for the installation of means to prevent further outbreaks of the disease. Surely Montreal has reason to be proud of her erstwhile distinguished citizen.
