Last year he attained his jubilee as Prince of Montenegro, and celebrated it by proclaiming his country a Kingdom. King Nicholas is the father of the Queen of Italy.

The Legislature of British Columbia has adopted a resolution condemning the Reciprocity agreement between Canada and the States.

PEKIN, Feb. 16.  
Several cases of cannibalism, as a result of the great Chinese famine, are reported to-day from the Province of Kiangsi, the centre of the starvation zone. A man, woman and two children were killed and their flesh eaten by villagers in a community in Western Szechuan Mountains. South of the Tea District.

LONDON, Feb. 17.  
Relations between Russia and China are strained to breaking point. Russia to-day notified the Government of Britain, France and Germany of her intention to make a military demonstration on the Russo-Chinese frontier, owing to China's persistent violation of the St. Petersburg Treaty of 1881. Russian troops will be sent at once into the district of Ili. The extent of the demonstration, it is added in the diplomatic note, will depend entirely upon the attitude of China. The vital questions involved are Free Trade in Mongolia; extra territorial rights of Russians in China; the establishment of a Russian consulate at Kobi, Mongolia, on the frontier between the possessions of Russia and the Chinese Province of Ili, as defined in the treaty.

A military demonstration by Russia against China must be viewed as a threat of punishment, rather than as a forerunner of actual war, as the military resources of the Chinese Government are decidedly limited. The army organization is of medieval, and the extensive plans of military re-organization are maturing slowly. At present China must rely on 100,000 Provincial troops, only part of whom have been trained in European methods. The interest in the Russo-Chinese situation depends chiefly on the attitude of the Powers, and especially of Russia's understanding with Japan. The other Powers would appear to have paved the way for any conceivable measures against China.

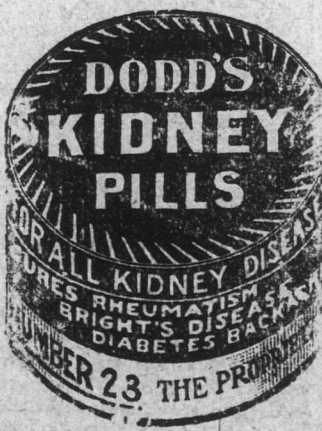

STEAMERS CAN'T RUN.—Conception Bay is filled with ice and as a result the service between Bell Island and Portugal Cove has been suspended for more than a week past. The Euphrates is jammed at the Cove, the Progress remains at Bell Island and the Mary is held up here all the week. The delay is a matter which badly affects the business people of the Island.

GETTING VESSEL READY.—For a long while past work of repairing the Spanish barque Countdrouhe has been going on and now the vessel's sails are being bent and the rigging put in order. The repairs to the vessel, including new sails, etc., will cost, it is said, \$10,000. Part of the crew, as already stated in the Telegram, will be Newfoundlanders and will take the vessel back to Spain.

### The Florizel Arrives. Seals at Heart's Ease.

The s.s. Florizel, Capt. Clarke, arrived here at 6 p.m. yesterday from New York via Halifax. The ship left New York at 7 a.m. Sunday and entered Halifax at 8 a.m. Tuesday. She had N. winds and fine weather on the run and left Halifax at 7 p.m. Tuesday. Coming down she encountered N. and N.W. winds with very frosty weather, and met a lot of ice off the eastern end of Nova Scotia. She forced through about 100 miles of it but met no more afterwards, except some strings of slob after passing Cape Race. She had N.N.E. winds and snow coming down the shore, and seen in the distance. The ship brought a full cargo, including 129 tons of coal to be used at the sealshery. She also brought 65 bags and 2 baskets of mail matter, and her passengers were: From New York—A. H. Rau, R. Crane, D. Sarnoff, G. F. Trainor, Mr. and Mrs. M. Sinnott and W. Gaulton. From Halifax—H. Coronaldi, H. W. Wyld, D. H. McDougall, H. Ellis, H. J. Crowe, W. A. Carroll and 2 second class.
