## The Short Fishery to the North.

The fishery north seems not to have recovered yet from the extraordinary lateness of the ice-blockade this year. While the fishery on the south and west coast seems on the whole well up to that of last year, that of the north is exceedingly backward. Taking the figures, posted in the Board of Trade rooms for the week ending July 11th with the corresponding period of 1913, we find:—

These figures show an aggregate shortage of 30,477 quintals.

The most noticeable change during the week has been the improvement in the fishery in the Straits and Placentia and St. Mary's. The fishery on the local grounds and in Conception Bay has also been improving during the past week.

We notice that American fishermen have also been complaining of being handicapped by the ice blockade. The appended editorial item is taken from the New York Fishing Gazette of July 11th.

"The greatest ice blockade in the recent history of the Atlantic fisheries will be associated with the spring of 1914 for a long time to come no doubt. Early in April the fish-looking fishing schooners, the great majority of which were direct from home ports, fitted out for the spring trip, all being bound for the Magdalen Islands, of course; for that is the spring herring's favorite haunt, and by that token, the chief source for obtaining bait at that season. ## A Floating Fish Market.

The giant liner Aquitania, which recently ended a maiden voyage in New York harbor from the other side, carries an amazing amount of provisions at sea. The regular supply of fish for a trip amounts to over six tons; 500 barrels of oysters are also stored away in the ocean greyhound before the "all ashore" whistle is sounded. In addition to that there are 500 pounds of green turtle, and a quantity of other provisions which do not concern the fishing industry.

## Clinical Congress to sit in London.

New York, July 15.—About 1,000 physicians and surgeons from the United States and Canada are expected to attend the meeting of the North American clinical congress in London from July 27th to August 1st, according to Dr. J. Murphy, president of the congress, who sailed yesterday on the Lusitania. Clinics will be held by many European surgeons and the Canadians and Americans will study their methods. Mr. Murphy explained. This is the first meeting of the congress to be held in Europe.

## The Kelligrew's Conflagrations

RENDERS FAMILY DESTITUTE.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—The most disastrous fire which ever occurred on this shore, took place here on Saturday morning, and a few black cinders marks the place where but a few hours previous stood the beautiful Chapel and School as well as the comfortable homes of Mr. George Craig and Mrs. Wm. Walsh. While this is an almost irreparable loss to the parish in itself, still the saddest feature of the disaster is the loss of those homes, with almost everything they possessed. Particularly harrowing is poor Craig's case, where his entire prosperity comprising in all six buildings and valued at three thousand dollars was entirely wiped out. Mr. Craig who is an old and faithful servant of the Reid Ndd. Co., was working at the time on No. 1 section, St. John's, and the saddest sight ever witnessed here was that of Mrs. Craig and her little family standing scantily clad and destitute of everything she owned in the world, in sight of her once comfortable home.

Perhaps few houses in the country was better known than that of Craig's in former years. Under the hospitable management of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Walsh, it was for many years a popular resort for city friends, and no doubt the sympathy of the city as well as this neighborhood, will go out to those poor people in their hour of distress.

This is indeed a fitting subject for the charity of our kind people who have shown that blessed trait of humanity to such marked degree in the past, and we feel sure a ready response will be given in behalf of the destitute homeless.
