ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

Official (Oct. 22).—To our left considerable German forces are continuing their violent attacks, especially around Dixmude, Waraon, Armentiers and La Bassée. The positions occupied by the Allies are being maintained. On the remainder of the front the enemy has only delivered partial attacks which have all been repulsed especially at Fricourt, east of Albert, and on the heights west of Craonne. In the region of Soissons, in the region Malancourt, in Woivre towards Chamblay and southeast of St. Mihiel and in Ailly woods, German attacks have been repulsed. We have slightly progressed in Argonne and in southern Woivre on the Montmartre woods.

Russian advance is taking effect as the result of an important victorious

that heavy fighting has been heard between Bruges and Ghent. It is reported that the German line of communication has been cut.

ABANDON DEFENSIVE POSITION.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.

A cable from the French Foreign Office, made public by the French Embassy here, says that the Germans before Warsaw have abandoned their defensive position, and are in retreat, pursued by Russians, who have captured many prisoners and munitions. The 17th and 20th German army corps have been decimated.

PROTEST AGAINST LAYING OF MINES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.

The British Embassy has made public a copy of a communication made by Britain to representatives of the

engagement in the region of Warsaw. The Russians have thrown the Germans back 13 kilometres. Elsewhere in the south the battle is continuing under favorable circumstances.

ENEMY BEATEN BACK.

LONDON, Oct. 22.

Governor, St. John's: The following is from the Press Bureau: Throughout the twentieth, the enemy made vigorous counter attacks against the Allies' front, but were beaten back, suffering considerable losses. The Belgian army in particular distinguished itself by a spirited and brave defence of its position.

SITUATION UNCHANGED.

To Governor, St. John's:

The following from the Press Bureau: Three British monitors have recently operated on the Belgian coast firing on the right flank of the German army and contributing materially to the success of the operations in that district. Detachments with machine guns landed from these vessels to assist in the defence of Neuport, have performed meritorious service. The German allegation of rebellion in Somaliland and the capture of Berbera is entirely without foundation. The situation in the Protectorate is unchanged since the outbreak of the war.

HARDCOURT.

These monitors, which were being built for the Brazilian Government, are of shallow draught for river work, and were bought at the declaration of war, and were completed in September. They are called the Humbert, Mersey and Severn, are of 1260 tons, and carry 2.6 and 2.47 guns.

VIOLENT BATTLE RAGING.

PARIS, Oct. 22.—(Official.) The activity, which was displayed yesterday, did not slacken today. Between the sea and La Bassée the battle continued with just as great violence, without the Germans being able to force back the Belgian, French or British troops. Similarly between Arras and the Oise, the enemy made determined efforts, which have, at no point, been crowned with success. In the Argonne region we have made progress between St. Hubert and Lefour de Paris, to the north of Verdun. At Hamont and Brebant on the Meuse we have gained ground. In the Woivre district we have repelled an attack on Champion.

GENERAL AND STAFF REPORTED KILLED.

LONDON, Oct. 22. A News Agency despatch received here states that British naval guns fired from vessels in the Channel, killed the German General Von Tripp and his staff at Middelkerke, south of Ostend on the coast.

NAVAL LOSSES.

LONDON, Oct. 22.

The Secretary of the Admiralty announces that the submarine boat E 3, commanded by Lieut.-Com. Cholmley, is now considerably overdue, and that it is feared she has been sunk in the North Sea. A wireless despatch received here from Berlin on Tuesday, said that E 3 had been sunk on Sunday, October 18th, by German warships. Her complement consisted of 15 men. It is reported that the British torpedo boat Drazd is ashore at Kirkwall, in Orkney Islands, off the coast of Scotland. Her crew is said to have been saved.

GERMAN TALK.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—(Official.) On the Year canal heavy fighting is still in progress. The enemy was reinforced by artillery fire from the sea at a point to the northwest of Neuport, but in the engagement a British torpedo boat was put out of action by our artillery. Fighting continues west of Lille, and here also our troops have assumed the offensive and repulsed the enemy at several points. The English have lost several machine guns. No decision has yet been reached in the eastern theatre of war.

A MATTER FOR PRIDE.

LONDON, Oct. 22.

The Press Bureau made public yesterday for the first time, the speech of Lord Crewe, Secretary of State for India, delivered last Tuesday to the officers recently appointed to the Government service of India. Indian forces, said the Secretary, will very soon be taking their places on the firing line, beside their British comrades. The enemy make it a matter of reproach that we are employing Asiatic troops in Europe. To that I am prepared to reply in the words of the University of Aberdeen: "They say, what say they, let them say." But I will add this, "It is not in our eyes matter of reproach, but matter for pride that our Indian fellow subjects feel themselves identified with ourselves in the present quarrel, and I fully expect the enemy may before the war ends learn several unneeded lessons from the Indian troops' lessons in chivalry and humanity and respect for persons and the homes of the poor and humble."

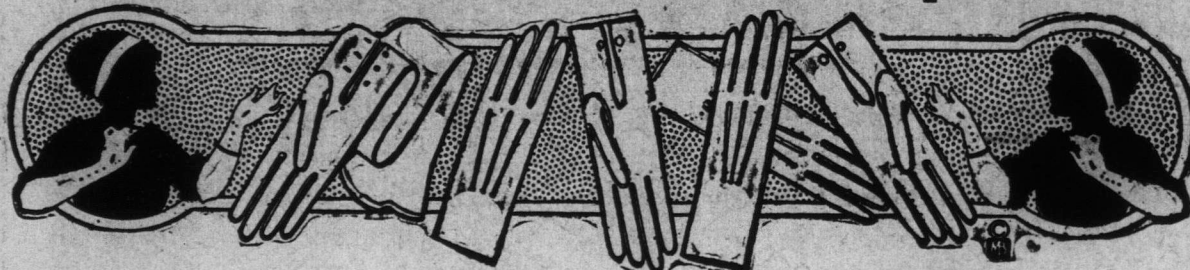
