OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 1. The Governor, Newfoundland:

The French Government reports small successes near Dixmude and Lombaertyzde, and important progress in Champagne. German works were carried north of Perthes and ausejour. Two hundred prisoners ere captured northwest of Perthes. and over 1,000 German soldiers surendered during the last ten days. A subsequent report confirms progress in Champagne, the gains representing 2,000 metres in trenches. In one rench the enemy left over 200 dead. In the Argonne about three hundred yards of trench was cantured. At nother point the Germans sprayed he advance French trench with burn-

The Russian Government reports their offensive developing in northeastern Poland. Przasnysz has been taken, and the German retreat is extending. About 5,500 have been taken

The Austrians were severely defeated in Eastern Galicia, losing 4,000 prisoners and nine machine guns. HARCOURT.

#### ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 1. Near Dixmude, Belgian artillery stroyed two German defence works. The Belgian infantry took a farm on he right banks of the Yser and Belian aviators threw bombs on the erman naval station of Ostend. The ermans are still bombarding Rheims nd threw about sixty shells, of hich thirty were directed against the Cathedral. In Champagne we have realized important gains, on Saturday night, by the capture of two German works north of Perthes les Hurlus and north of Beausejour farm. urthermore, we have progressed beween these two points and made 200 risoners. The number of German oldiers who have surrendered during the past ten days exceed 1,000: A sharp artillery contest occurred on the Meuse heights and in the osges. We have progressed in the vicinity of Arhmans and Willerkopl.

#### FRENCH MAKING SUPREME EF-FORT.

PARIS, March 1. Terrific efforts are being made by he French to break the German lines n Champagne district in order to rce a retirement of the Kaiser's orces between the Aisne and Oise Rivers. In the past five days at least hirty attacks have been made by the French against the German lines bewen Souain and Servor, north of Perthes, Beausejour and Les Hurlue. The German armies lying in the angle formed by the junction of the Aisne and the Oise Rivers, will continue to be a menace to Paris until they are forced to retire. These armies are only forty miles from Paris and if Von Kluck could pierce the rench lines with a sudden movegent near Soissons, he could not only drive in the direction of Paris, but ould split the entire French force in wo. In West Flanders the Belgians are continuing their activity against he extreme German right using both nfantry and artillery in their atacks. Heavy artillery fire is reported from the district northeast of Amiens and south of the Lys, as well as from the valley of the Meuse. In the Vosges mountains the struggle for strategic points is becoming fier-cer. The Germans have been rein-forced with Landsturm forces brought from southern Belgium, where they had been used as patrols

### HALIFAX SCARED BY SHELL.

HALIFAX, March 1. A twelve-pound shell, presumably red from one of the harbour forts during target practice, entered two uses in the residential section here his afternoon. No one was in the ouses at the time. The people living the vicinity were panic stricken or a while, thinking that an enemy's had fired the shell.




