THE RETREAT FROM RIGA.

LONDON, To-day.
Riga, Russia's big port on the Gulf
of Riga, is in the hands of the Ger-
mans, and its garrison and civilian
population are retreating eastward.
Following up the railway advantage
they gained in driving the Russians
across the Dvina River on both sides
of Uxul, on Saturday last, the Ger-
mans threw bridges across the stream
and soon were on the heels of the
former defenders, some of whom offer-
ed resistance, but others of whom
showed the white feather, giving the
invaders no trouble in marching up
the eastern bank of the Dvina toward
Riga, 15 miles distant. Seeing the dis-
affection and inability to stem the tide
of advance, the Russian commander
ordered an evacuation. With the fail-
ing back of the Russians from the city
proper and the advance of the Ger-
mans northward along both sides of
the stream, the Russians, defending
the western bank around Dahlen seem-
ingly are in danger of being caught
between two fast moving bodies of the
enemy and made prisoners. Behind
them the Russians in retreat from
Riga are leaving the country in waste,
burning villages and farms. Whether
the city itself remains intact has not
been made known, but doubtless the
guns in the fortress and the ammuni-
tion stores either were moved or de-
stroyed to prevent them falling into
the hands of the Germans. Aside from
its strategic value in controlling the
Gulf of Riga and of a base nearer the
mouth of the Gulf of Finland, at the
head of which Petrograd is situated,
for the moment it is impossible to see
the importance of the Germans' gain,
and especially with the near approach
of winter, when military operations in
this northern region are almost impos-
sible. Where the Russians had drawn
their line in the north to connect with
that below the point of penetration by
the Germans remains to be seen. On
none of the other fronts have there
been operations of great moment, ex-
cept in the Austro-Italian theatre,
where the Italians have made further
progress on the Bainsizza Plateau and
Brestovizza Valley and at various
points along the line. Advances to the
Italian Embassy in Washington are to
the effect that along the front of the
present offensive the Austrians have
lost more than 125,000 men. Reports
from Udine, Italy, give the Austrian
losses as one-third of the first line
army.

BRITISH OFFICIAL.

LONDON, To-day.
An official report from British Head-
quarters in France to-night reads:
A hostile raiding party which at-
tempted to approach our lines early
this morning southwest of LaBassee
was driven back by our fire before
reaching our trenches. The enemy's
artillery has shown considerable ac-
tivity during the day north of Ypres.
Last night our airplanes dropped over
three tons of bombs on the enemy's
aerodromes with good results. In the
air fighting one German machine was
brought down and one was driven
down out of control. One of ours is
missing.

THE RUSSIAN DEBACLE.

PETROGRAD, To-day.
The German offensive on the Riga
front began on Saturday by an attack
on the Russian Uxul position, follow-
ing an artillery preparation which
lasted several hours. The Russian
troops defending the Dvina River
withdrew and the Germans succeeded
in throwing two bridges across Dvina
and passing to the eastern bank. The
Russian Infantry, in spite of a brilliant

action of the artillery, which destroy-
ed one of the enemy's bridges, could
not stop the German thrust and the
enemy, taking advantage of this, rap-
idly developed his success and began
to advance northward. Russian
counter attacks against him were un-
successful.

Boy Thieves on the Rampage Again.

Four lads, who are well known in
police circles and who have a fond-
ness for being out all night doing
mischief, were arrested at an early
hour this morning for larceny. Short-
ly after last midnight they took a
boat containing a quantity of tea,
pork, sugar, milk, bread, onions and
potatoes. The delinquents were en-
joying their moonlight excursion un-
til caught by Constable Whelan near
the Dry Dock. They had divided the
provisions amongst them and much
of the stock had been consumed when
the lads were captured. They were
brought before Judge Morris in the
Police Court to-day and acknowledged
the theft. They were remanded in
custody until the owners of the goods
are located. One of the prisoners
was bailed only a few days ago for
similar conduct.

mother's care.

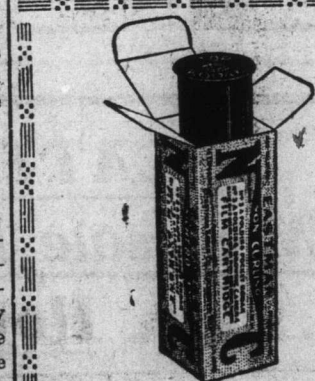

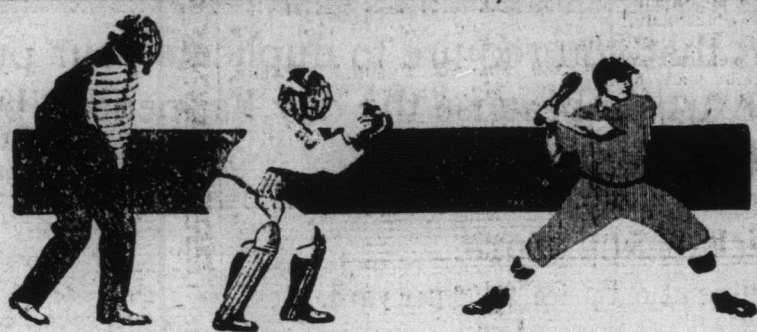

Motor Car Drivers in Court.

The police have begun a vigorous
campaign of prosecuting motor car
drivers whom they believe are break-
ing the law. As a result three de-
fendants were before court to-day. The

days. The next was convicted of hav-
ing only one head light going and was
fined \$10 or 10 days; the third was
charged with having too much light
on his car. The latter case was de-
ferred after the hearing of several
witnesses, for the purpose of getting
expert evidence as to what twenty-five
per cent. of normal candle power is.
