American fishing interests claim that foreign fish can be following regulation with regard to caught, brought into Atlantic counsh shipments to Brazil: ports and sold at a lower price than that for which American fishermen can sell. As an ilinstance, which has been sent broadcast to every fish centre in the States. The facts are these: Early in January of this year the steam trawler "Sir John French," owned by Halifax parties, arrived at a Boston fish pier with a trip of haddock and cod, which was sold in competition with American caught fish and met with ready purchase, though the prices paid are not given. It is urged, however, that the wages paid the crew of the British trawler is much less than that demanded and received by American crews. Hence it is argued that to permit foreign competition on an even basis would be to put the American fishing fleet out of business.
