Editorial Items.

THE PEEL BONUS TO THE CREDIT VALLEY RAILWAY.—It seems that steps are being taken to set aside the bonus lately granted by the County of Peel to the Credit Valley Railway. The other day Mr. Bethune, on behalf of the plaintiffs in the case, moved, before Judge Galt, that the bonus granted be set aside on the ground that among those who voted for the by-law were many who were not qualified voters. It seems that the Corporation of Peel has taken this step, and it may be that the ratepayers in that County will have another opportunity of voting on a by-law, and deciding whether they will grant a bonus to the Credit Valley or the Hamilton and North Western Railway.

Lieut. Col. G. A. French is by an extra Gazette appointed to the regimental command of the artillery of Ontario. It also says: "Lieut. Col. Strange will take rank precedence, and command in the Militia with all Lieutenant-Colonels from the date of his appointment (13th Sept. 1872). He is appointed an inspector of artillery and warlike stores for the Dominion, and to the regimental command of the artillery of the Province of Quebec.

The German Charge at Rome has shut up his bureau and gone home with "unlimited leave of absence." And so Germany follows the example of Switzerland in suspending relations with a potentate whose functions have become purely spiritual. The reference to Germany in his papal allocution seems to have created great heat in official circles of the Empire; even any quotation of these utterances is forbidden the newspapers under pain of confiscation.

The Philadelphia Press is out promptly for the annexation of the Sandwich Islands. It thinks the group may be had for the asking, and if the U. S. Resident Minister has properly exerted himself, may be even now floating the Stars and Stripes, and calling itself the United States Territories of the Sandwich Islands.

The Richmond Enquirer makes mention of a projected recumbent statue of Gen. Lee, on a sarcophagus—the whole to be made of Vermont marble.

Garibaldi's second wife is 35 years old, and is described as a dark, handsome woman, with fierce eyes, and thick hair parted at the side of the head.

The Tin Mines of the North Shore of Lake Superior.

The Marquette Mining Journal of Nov 30th, says: At last we have news from the tin mines of the North shore from an authentic source. Captain Harris and party arrived in Marquette on Monday morning, per schooner Shenanag. They had several large bags containing the precious tin ore, or the rocks supposed to contain the precious stuff.

That tin exists in the locality visited, the party claim there is no doubt. Some of their samples were partially assayed on Tuesday, and the product was found to be tin. How rich or poor was not ascertained, by reason of the assay not being fully completed. Further and more complete tests are to be made at Detroit.

The rock shown to us looked more like silver than anything we have seen, and that which is supposed to bear tin was so lean in the traces of this metal, if a trace could be determined by the crystals which represent the metal, that it seemed difficult to discover that enough of it existed to make good the pretence that such a metal existed in it.

Nevertheless, the fact is established that tin does exist in the rock formation at Otter Head Bay, on the north shore of Lake Superior, and if the locality was at first "salted" to make a good speculation of the property, there was some foundation upon which to lay the "salt."

Further investigations are to be made the nature of which will depend upon the result of the assays of the ore now in hand.

FAT CATTLE FROM ABERDEENSHIRE.—To give some idea of the extent of the traffic in fat cattle, &c., from Aberdeen, Scotland, to London, the Aberdeen Free Press mentions that in the five days ending the 13th Dec., there were sent to London from three stations in Aberdeenshire, 293 car loads of fat cattle, sheep, and pigs, containing 1,753 cattle, 283 sheep, and 202 pigs. Last year during the same days 241 car loads were dispatched with an aggregate of 1,551 animals. Within the memory of not very old men, no fat cattle were produced in Aberdeenshire, or in the north of Scotland generally. All were sent as mere skeletons to be fatted in England. Improved farming, and especially turnip husbandry, have revolutionized the whole state of matters, and now Aberdeenshire is one of the best and most abundant sources of supply of fat cattle for the London market, and its farmers are among the most comfortable and enterprising in the whole of Scotland.

A St. Paul paper says that Colonel W. Macgillivray, Chief of the American survey party on the International boundary, returned to that city on the 23rd ult. The whole party will rendezvous at Davenport in winter.
