Local Council of Women Discuss Social Problems

SOCIAL and economic questions were the chief matters for discussion at the executive meeting of the Local Council of Women held yesterday afternoon in the "Y" parlors. The president, Mrs. R. R. Jamieson, read the list of a course of lectures on "Equal Moral Standards" which are being given in Edmonton under the auspices of the local council, and urged that such a course be started here. It was agreed that something of the kind would be of infinite value to Calgary, but as the season was late now, it was decided to leave the matter over till the June meeting when a committee to make arrangements could be formed.

At request from the Y.W.C.A. was read asking the local council to petition that in case where children become the victims of unscrupulous men, the names of the children be suppressed. In connection with this a great deal of discussion arose, the women being unanimous that such a law should be enforced, but urging also the necessity of further readjustments in social evils.

Mrs. Jamieson stated that she had approached Chief Cuddy on many points and he has assured her that while the police department was willing to do all they could to put wrongs right, till some of the present laws were changed nothing could be done. In the case of assault, Mrs. Jamieson said that girls did not like to give evidence, yet unless a charge was laid in the usual way, neither the chief nor any police official had the right to act though the man be known guilty. The question arose of girls being allowed at once to give evidence and in the case of the girls being helped out at once, they had to answer a number of questions, and in fact prove that they themselves were "above suspicion."

"Why Should a Girl Have to Prove Her Chastity?"

asked Mrs. Harold Riley, "before she can convict a man of seducing her?" should not the man have to prove he is immoral instead?

Mrs. Jamieson stated that quite a number of persons had not been satisfied in the case of the little French girl brought here by the Italian and this and other things, she and Mrs. Kerby meant to talk over with the chief, in the hope of getting light on many of the laws they are and as they might be. Local Council of Women Discuss Social Problems

Little French girl had been quite straight before this happened, but Mrs. Kerby asked what difference that made to the fact that she had been brought here under false pretences, and had almost been forced to marry a man she did not wish to marry? Instances were given of men accusing girls in street cars and places of amusement, one lady in a theatre taking no more notice of her tormentor than by smacking her hatpin into him, while another, who was pointed out, however, the danger for a girl lay as much in other people seeing her being accused as in insult from the accuser.
