Washington, Feb. 13.—The Ways and Means Committee of the House will be petitioned to prepare a bill invoking the condemnation of the Government upon the cigarette habit. Representatives Cechrane, Cummings and Staplenecker, of New York, all have in their possession bills which they have been petitioned to introduce providing for the suppression of cigarette manufacture by imposing an internal revenue tax of \$10 per 1,000 on all imported or domestic cigarettes in this country.
