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WESTERN ONTARIO.

Magistrate Bell, of Colchester, is dead. He was one of the oldest inhabitants in the township.

Miss Maggie Murray, of Wilton Grove, has been engaged by the trustees of the Lambeth public school.

The grocers of Petrolia are petitioning the Town Council to try and repeal the early closing bylaw now in force there.

A shooting match at Hyde Park the other day resulted in a victory for D. Graham's team over that captained by Ed Harrison.

F. C. Fulmer, while walking along Ferry street, Windsor, on Saturday, was shot in the leg by a bullet from a rifle in the hands of a boy.

The Barnum iron works, Windsor, have completed arrangements for a large branch factory of their works to be located at West Toronto.

Ellis, the German cowboy, was brought up before Judge Jones at Bradford and sentenced to 1 year and 11 months for obtaining money under false pretences.

The Sarnia Council shall off the water from the contractors on the approach to the tunnel, because they would not pay regular rates, and then they paid the rates asked for.

On the standing of the township of East Lutherville, Puffin, a colony, has been fined \$100 and costs by Wm. Osborne, J.P., at Grand Valley, for violating the Ontario Medical Act.

At the shooting at Lynhurst on Thursday two lads named Wm. and J. W. Ingram were both shot in the side of the face, a number of the shots lodging in the chest.

The wounds are not serious. Judge Macdonald withdrew the case of the Queen vs. Stillwell, Ball and Boughner, at the Elgin Assizes, charged with setting fire to a hotel in Bayham township, with three miles of a jaunt still before them.

The residence of T. Pellow, St. Thomas, was entered by thieves on Thursday evening during the absence of the family, and the house ransacked. The intruders secured a revolver and a pocket book containing a number of receipts.

At Windsor on Saturday, Isaac Lair, charged with stealing cattle in Colchester, pleaded not guilty and elected to be tried by jury. Told quick was discharged on the charges of stealing cattle, but he will be arraigned for receiving stolen property.

Geo. Herd, aged about 9 or 10 years, while playing with a companion at Stratford on Saturday was shot in the side of the head by Walter Quinn, a boy of similar age, with a 22-caliber revolver.

Fortunately the bullet struck a thick part of the skull and was extruded.

Johnnie McHugh, the 8-year-old son of Mr. Hugh McHugh, of Stratford, was run over by a wagon drawing a load of hay, and seriously injured. The horse, which was the little fellow's leg, near the groin, and bruised it badly, but did not break any bones. His condition is very serious.

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
