THE TORONTO INDUSTRIAL.

Farmers' Day Was Decidedly a Record-Breaker.

Upwards of 80,000 Visitors Passed the Turnstiles—American Visitors' Day Marked by a Large Attendance—Some of the Notable Exhibits Described.

TORONTO, Sept. 13.—The attendance yesterday (Farmers' Day) at the exhibition grounds was a record-breaker. Upwards of 80,000 visitors passed the turnstiles. The receipts were over \$19,000, which exceeds all previous records by several thousand dollars. Today is American Visitors' Day, and despite the unsettled weather another great crowd is on the ground. The bicycle races have been further postponed until tomorrow, the track being in a wet condition. The officers of the Grand Lodge of Patrons and Patron members-elect were in attendance today.

During the fireworks display yesterday one of the mortars from which the rockets are thrown, exploded, and a large piece of the shell, weighing about eight pounds, struck Mrs. A. M. Jolly, of Bathurst street, on both thighs, inflicting two deep gashes, besides internal injuries. The doctors were unable to determine the full extent of the injuries, but it is feared they will prove fatal.

Don Valley Bricks.

On the ground floor of the main building at the Toronto Industrial Exhibition, a little west of the grand stand, is the tastefully-arranged exhibit of the Don Valley Pressed Brick Works. Excellence in pressed bricks requires something more than a brick-making machine, and it is only by the union of many necessary factors that the Don Valley works have achieved their proud position. Not only do their proprietors possess what is practically a monopoly of the exact kinds of body needed, but by the use of large capital, the employment of the most skillful, scientific and other help, and the closest kind of industry, they have been able to place themselves literally beyond competition. As a proof of the high esteem in which the Don Valley bricks are held it is only necessary to state that the company at this moment are furnishing material for the largest works that are going on in Toronto, Montreal, Halifax, Ottawa and many other places. The palatial residence of Mr. Andrew Allan, of Montreal, now being built of the red bricks from the Don, has been described as "a poem in brick-work." The mansion of Mr. Meredith, local manager of the bank of Montreal at that place, is another notable successful work. The Merchants' Bank of Halifax, the Mission Hall, corner Jarvis and Queen, Toronto, the impressive building of Mr. S. F. McKinnon, at the corner of Jordan and Melinda streets, and the Union Station, are other instances of work now progressing that will endure and give pleasure to the eye for generations to come while the completed works it is only necessary to look to almost any important residence, church, public institution or business block in Montreal, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Ottawa, Halifax, Guelph, Galt, Bowmanville, Oshawa, Belleville, Berlin, Kingston, Brockville, St. Marys, or indeed, any progressive place in Canada, to see that this knowledge of the company's instruments is a profound and lasting and most beneficial change has been made in the appearance of our cities.

The Don works' exhibit at the fair arrests the attention of every passer-by. The enameled work is particularly interesting, showing, as it does, to what lengths ingenuity and artistic taste can go in transforming an unpromising subject as a brickbat into a real work of art. The buff bricks of this company, also, are articles with which there is no possible comparison elsewhere in Canada. They are not colored artificially, as are certain bricks offered by persons who possess neither the knowledge nor the materials necessary to produce a really good article. The beautiful color they bear is that produced naturally by the burning of certain very carefully selected clays, and so it will endure indefinitely, even increasing in beauty as its tone is mellowed by age. The red bricks, too, are easily and away ahead of all competitors, and being, too, of the natural color are not subject to fading or washing away. The products of the Don brick works are in fact such as any country might be proud of, and very few people in Toronto have any idea of the present, and much less of the future, importance of an industry, which, although in its infancy, is fairly entitled to a place in the front rank in the enumeration of our resources.

MUSIC AND DRAMA.

Opening of "Lost in New York" Engraving—Sol Smith Russell and "Fencing Master" Coming Next Week.

SOL SMITH RUSSELL. Sol Smith Russell opens his annual engagement on Monday evening for two nights, when he will appear in his very successful new play, "Peaceful Valley," and "The Hair at Law." Mr. Russell is a wholesome, clean, as well as a very droll and amusing actor. That one may be funny without becoming vulgar, that comedy may stop short of suggestion without losing zest, and that it is as easy to evoke laughter without at the same time calling a blush to the cheek, are facts in the sphere of humor that Mr. Russell early recognized and has ever respected. He loses no friends he has made and steadily gains new ones.

"FENCING MASTER" ON WEDNESDAY. The Grand Opera House could not possibly present a better or a brighter attraction for the Fall season than that announced for Wednesday evening next week in the shape of the Whitney Opera Company in Don Koven & Smith's tawful and most popular work, "The Fencing Master." The opera itself is purely theatrical. It appeals to the heart, not the head. The songs and dialogues seem a dreamy Venetian romance of years ago, when men made love and women responded with more fire than in today's cold atmosphere. The soft airs, tender refrains and gentle passages are of a distinctly different school than the light opera of the Casanova style. It is a true picture of the Italy of old. "When knights were bold and barons held their sway." The three acts are three gems of stagework, and the costumes so very brilliant that pictures quite kaleidoscopic are constantly in the foreground. When here last season the opera made the biggest kind of a hit, and the warmth of its reception Wednesday night is already assured. Good comic operas like "The Fencing Master" are only all too scarce.

"LOST IN NEW YORK." After a lapse of some four years the drama "Lost in New York" was given at the Grand last evening, opening a three nights' engagement with Saturday matinee. The house was well filled and the play pronounced good. The scenery is exceptionally fine, and the acting places familiar to many who have visited Gotham. Added to this is the large volume of water held by tanks, etc., occupying the entire stage. A steamboat plies across it, making a capital bit of realism.

BLAZING FORESTS. Trout Creek, Michigan, Threatened With Destruction—A Powder Mill in Peril. BESSEMER, Mich., Sept. 13.—The Gogebic powder mill is in imminent danger of destruction from forest fires, which the department has been fighting for the last 24 hours in the face of a strong wind. Trout Creek, Mich., is again threatened with destruction. Several railroad bridges have been burned. Several buildings at Iron Belt, Wis., on the Wisconsin Central, have been burned by forest fires. At Wakefield, Ontario, a forest fire has burned in the Gogebic and Ontonagon counties.

The late Jay Gould, James Fiske, Oakes Ames, and ex-Senator Stanford, with the Vanderbilts, Rockefellers, Harringtons, Pullmans, etc., are among the examples doubtless of genius, industry, and thrift. They secured millions they never produced. Dollars don't grow spontaneously. They present the fruits of somebody's labor. I will venture to assert that the man who has in him the ability to deceive others successfully, the genius to overreach his fellows, and the perseverance to continue on these lines, has a better opportunity than ever before to acquire the result of other people's labor. The chief cardinal virtue in the public mind today is wealth. The chief deadly sin is poverty, writes P. O. Larkin in August Donahoe's.
