Hostilities Have Begun

An Armored Train Has Been Destroyed by the Boers.

And It Is Feared Much Loss of Life Will Result.

Active Steps Taken to Defend Mafeking.

Text of Britain's Reply to the Boers' Ultimatum—The Transvaal's Formal Declaration of War.

Cape Town, Oct. 12.—9:45 a.m.—A dispatch from Vryburg says that an armored train has been destroyed. It is feared that much loss of life will result.

The news has been officially confirmed.

NON-COMBATANTS REMOVED.
Mafeking, Cape Colony, Oct. 12.—As the Boers, in strong force threaten this place the situation is so serious that all non-combatants have been notified that they will be taken away at the expense of the imperial government and housed in Cape Town. A railroad train carrying 300 women and children were escorted by a detachment of Col. Baden-Powell's force as far south as Vryburg, where the Cape Railway becomes responsible for the safety of the passengers.

LAING'S NEK.
London, Oct. 12.—The second edition of the Standard says that a dispatch from Ladysmith, dated yesterday morning, says that it is again reported that the Boers have occupied Laing's Nek, the young burghers insisting upon the occupation despite the more prudent counsels.

Telegraph wires connecting the Free State have been cut, and an immediate advance of the Boers is not anticipated.

ROYAL IRISH FUSILIERS AT DUR-
BAN.

London, Oct. 12.—Albertina, which, in a dispatch from Durban, was reported to have been seized on Thursday by the Boers, is a station in the Free State, on the Harrismith line. Harrismith is equipped and officered directly by Natal troops. Durban advises received here say that the Royal Irish Fusiliers have arrived there, and that military headquarters are being removed to Ladysmith, whither Gen. Sir George Stewart White, Gen. Sir Archibald Hunter and Gen. Symons, with their staffs, have already gone.

MR. HOFMEYER'S APPEAL.
Cape Town, Oct. 12.—Mr. Hofmeyer, in his appeal issued under the auspices of the Afrikaner Bund, asking for subscriptions for the relief of the widows and families of burghers killed in the Transvaal, says: "Notwithstanding strenuous efforts to preserve peace, war has been virtually declared. There are few Afrikaners not bound by ties of relationship and friendship with the inhabitants of both republics, and natural sympathy should express itself in legitimate form, and do what can be done. To take weapons and join the work of warfare, their duty as British subjects forbids, and accordingly he appeals to each person to contribute the utmost."

BRITAIN'S REPLY.
London, Oct. 12.—The following is the text of the British reply to the Boer ultimatum:

"Mr. Chamberlain to Sir Alfred Milner, high commissioner, sent 10:45 p.m., Oct. 10, 1899:

"Her majesty's government have received with great regret the peremptory demands of the South African Republic, conveyed in your telegram of Oct. 9. You will inform the government of the South African Republic in reply that the conditions demanded by the government of the South African Republic are such as her majesty's government deem it impossible to discuss."

"The Daily Mail's correspondent at Pietermaritzburg says it is rumored at Newcastle that the destruction of documents incriminating President Kruger and other members of the executive body has commenced at Pretoria."

A dispatch from Durban, dated Thursday, eight o'clock a.m., announced that the Boers seized Alber-

tina station and demanded the keys, which were delivered to them by the station master, who reached Ladysmith on a trolley. The excitement at Ladysmith is increasing, and the troops are ready to act at a moment's notice.

A Vryburg dispatch says: A body of Boers have cut the border fence, advanced to the railway and cut the telegraph wires. Two thousand Boers are now occupying the railway line.

A BRITISH FLYING SQUADRON.
New York, Oct. 12.—A dispatch to the World from London says: The formation of a British flying squadron has been considered with interest. It is purely a defensive measure, and inspired by the bitter hostility to England displayed by the continental press. The Russian official organs are foremost in threats and incitements to join in action against Great Britain, and though officially Germany proclaims itself neutral, the German press is second only to the Russian in its denunciation of England's South African policy. Though not believing at present that these outbursts of rancor will materialize, the British government is taking timely precautions against eventualities. The difficulty and delay in mobilizing an army corps for South Africa is regarded as most unfortunate, and calculated to induce Britain's enemies abroad to take advantage of the present crisis to satisfy old animosities.

TEN THOUSAND KAFFIRS IN TRANSIT.
Lorenzo Marquez, Oct. 12.—Ten thousand Kaffirs from the Rand have been brought here by train, and are now camped about six miles outside Durban. Steamers are being chartered to take them to the Limpopo district.

DEFENSE OF MAPEKING.
Cape Town, Oct. 12.—At 6:40 o'clock Wednesday evening, three carriages containing women and children, but not a single white man, excepting the drivers, were dispatched from Mafeking. The preparations for the defense of Mafeking are excellent. Every man in Mafeking is carrying a rifle, and the military authorities are endeavoring to obtain all the arms and ammunition they can lay hands on.

BRITISH REINFORCEMENTS.
Durban, Oct. 12.—The first and second battalions of the Manchester Regiment, under Lieut.-Col. Curran and Ridley, have arrived at Ladysmith.
