Plebiscite Campaign

Necessity of Looking After the Voters' Lists.

Important Information for Workers in the Coming Conflict.

The Persons Entitled to Vote on the Prohibition Question—Those Excluded—Provisions of the Assessment and the Voters' Lists Acts.

The submission of information will be of use to many of our workers in the impending conflict. A PRESSING DUTY.

It is of the utmost importance to our cause that every available prohibition vote should be polled on Jan. 1 next. In this contest we do not win by a bare majority. We win a victory that will be of value in proportion to the size of the majority recorded in favor of prohibition. The voting is not upon a direct law. It is simply an expression of public opinion, and its worth will be in its own right. Every vote polled will be an increment of strength to our cause, and every prohibition vote unpollled will be a weakness.

These facts place upon us a heavy responsibility to do our utmost in the impending campaign. In order that our votes may be polled it is absolutely necessary that they should first be made pollable. Votes cannot be polled unless the voters' names are on the voters' list. Bearing in mind this important fact we must urge upon prohibitionists everywhere to at once take steps to see that the voters' lists to be used on Jan. 1 next are made as complete as possible, from a temperance standpoint.

There should be at once appointed in every municipality a select working committee to see that this result is attained. The submitted information has been carefully compiled for the use of workers generally, and such committees in particular.

WHO MAY VOTE.

The persons entitled to vote on the prohibition question on Jan. 1 next are:

1. All men entitled to vote at an election for the Legislative Assembly.

2. All women entitled to vote at municipal elections.

Any male person 21 years of age, a British subject by birth or naturalization, has a right to have his name placed on the voters' list if he has (a) resided within the Province for the nine months next preceding the time fixed for beginning to make the assessment roll, or (b) has resided within the Province for the twelve months next preceding the time up to which application can be made to the county judge to insert his name on the list, provided that he was in good faith at the time of beginning to make such roll or complaint, a resident of the municipality in the list of which he is entered. Temporary absence at work, as laborer, miner, fisherman or as a student in Canada, shall not disentitle such person to be entered on the list. Any enfranchised Indian or non-enfranchised Indian not residing among Indians or on an Indian reserve may also have his name placed on the list. A person who is to be 21 years of age within 60 days of the date of the final revision of the assessment roll may be placed on the list.

Unmarried women or widows of the full age of 21 years and subjects of her Majesty by birth or naturalization have a right to be entered upon the assessment roll and upon the municipal voters' lists who are: (1) in their own right freeholders in the municipality, or (2) householders or tenants in the municipality, or (3) in receipt of an income of not less than \$400 per annum. The property to be owned or occupied must be worth \$100; in towns where the population is not over 3,000, \$200; in towns with a population of over 3,000, \$300, and in cities \$400.

The following persons are not permitted to vote: judges, clerks of the peace, county attorneys, customs officers, registrars, sheriffs and deputies, crown land agents, postmasters, stipendiary magistrates, excise officers, prisoners in jail, patients in asylums, patients in municipal or provincial charitable institutions or receiving aid therefrom.

No person is entitled to vote whose name is not entered on the voters' list. The voters' list is made up of three parts: Part 1. Names of men entitled to vote at municipal elections. Part 2. Names of men and women entitled to vote at municipal elections only. Part 3. Names of men entitled to vote at Legislative Assembly elections only.

To enable them to vote on the prohibition question on Jan. 1 next, men's names must be entered on part 1, or part 3, and women's names must be entered on part 2.

The voters' lists for the different municipalities in the Province of Ontario are based upon the assessment rolls, and the regular mode of securing a place on the voters' lists for the name of any person entitled to vote is through the assessor. The law has, however, provided for securing the rights of voters who have failed to obtain recognition in the regular way. The following summary of information will show how this can be accomplished.

FROM THE ASSESSMENT ACT 1902.

Unless in special cases hereafter mentioned the assessment is to be completed in each municipality and the assessor's roll is to be filed with the clerk of the municipality on or before April 30. This roll shall then be open to the public for inspection. (Sec. 50.) Any person aggrieved by the assessment or of whose name has been wrongfully omitted from the roll may have the error corrected by giving to the clerk notice of his intention to appeal. Such notice must be given within fourteen days after April 30, or within fourteen days after the day of the return of the assessor's roll if that return takes place later than April 30. (Sec. 54, subsec. 1, 2.)

A court of revision shall then be held to consider all appeals against the assessment. This court is not to hold its first sitting until at least ten days after the first sitting of the court of revision. (Sec. 54, subsec. 3.) The sitting of the court must be advertised ten days in the newspapers. Notice must be given to persons concerning whom complaint has been made. (Sec. 54, subsec. 7.) The work of the court of revision shall be complete before July 1. (Sec. 64, subsec. 10.)

If any elector has failed to secure his rights from the court of revision he may appeal to the county judge, notice of such appeal being given to the clerk of the municipality within five days from the date fixed for closing the court of revision; that is, from July 1. (Sec. 68, subsec. 2.) The county judge shall fix a date for hearing these appeals, which must all be heard and determined before Aug. 1. (Sec. 68, subsec. 7.)

The foregoing provisions of the Assessment Act are those applicable to municipalities generally. It is provided, however, that cities, towns and incorporated villages may pass bylaws providing for the taking of their assessment between the 1st day of July and the 30th day of September. In such cases the assessment work shall be completed by Oct. 1, the court of revision shall close on Nov. 15, and the assessor's work must be completed by Dec. 31. Of course, this has all been done in those municipalities in which it could affect the voters' lists to be used on Jan. 1 next.

There are also special provisions for the taking of assessment in the municipality of Shunna, and in certain municipalities in the districts of Muskoka, Parry Sound, Nipissing, Thunder Bay, and Rainy River. It is also in the power of county councils to fix dates for the taking of the assessment in the municipalities within their jurisdiction. Such dates must be fixed between Feb. 1 and July 1. If the date for the completion of the assessment is later than May 1, then the court of revision is to be held on the date on which the assessment closes, and the final return of the judge is to be made six weeks later.

The cases just mentioned are, however, exceptional. Full information in regard to the manner in which any particular municipality may always be obtained from the clerk of that municipality, who will generally be found willing to give all such information.

FROM THE VOTERS' LISTS ACT, 1899.

Immediately after the final revision by the judge of the assessment roll the clerk of the municipality shall make and post up in different places a list of persons appearing upon the assessment roll to be entitled to vote at Legislative Assembly elections and municipal elections. This list shall be posted in cities within 40 days, and in other municipalities within 30 days from the date of the final revision of the assessment roll. (Sec. 3.) Copies of the list shall be filed at every postoffice in the municipality. (Sec. 4.) If no appeals are made against this list within 30 days from the time of its being posted the county judge shall certify to it as being correct. (Sec. 10.)

Appeals may be made against the list if incorrect. Notice of such appeals is to be given to the clerk within 30 days after the posting of the list. If such appeals are made the county judge will hold a court to decide them, notice of such court being published ten days. (Sec. 13.)

The judge shall hold his court that all complaints shall be heard, and the list finally certified to, within two months of the last day fixed for making complaints. (Sec. 15.)

It will be seen from the foregoing statement that appeals may be made to the court of revision against the assessment, to the county judge against the court of revision, and again to the county judge against mistakes in the voters' lists. Persons entitled to vote can have their names added to the voters' list by making the necessary application within 30 days after the clerk has posted his first draft of the list. The clerk will furnish the necessary forms to those desiring to make such application.

The right plan for committees to take is: 1. Ascertain when this list is posted. 2. Immediately after its being posted, carefully scrutinize it and ascertain what qualified voters are omitted from it. 3. See that application is made to the clerk to have these names added to the list. 4. See that the application is followed up by the necessary appearance before the county judge, and the giving of evidence to show that the names should be added. It will be manifest that this work must be looked after by a carefully selected committee in every municipality.

A HUSBAND AT FOURTEEN.

The Bridegroom Two Years Younger than the Bride.

CLYDE, N. Y., May 18.—Byron H. Davis, the 14-year-old son of John Davis, of Clyde, and Miss Nellie Taylor, aged 16, daughter of George Taylor, of Savannah, N. Y., eloped on Saturday evening and were married in Seneca Falls at the home of Miss Hollister on Sunday evening. The affair has caused quite a sensation on account of the youth of the contracting parties. Davis was in town yesterday trying to make peace with his parents, while his wife is still at Seneca Falls.

Leaped Into the Red River.

WINNIPEG, May 18.—A young woman named Jones last night quarreled with her lover, named Arthur, and declared she would kill herself. Putting on her hat and coat she proceeded to Broadway bridge, and without hesitation threw herself into the Red River. Arthur, who had followed her from a distance, plunged in after her, but the young woman was determined to die, and fought desperately with her would-be rescuer. Arthur was nearly drowned in the struggle, but the timely arrival of spectators of the incident saved both lives.
